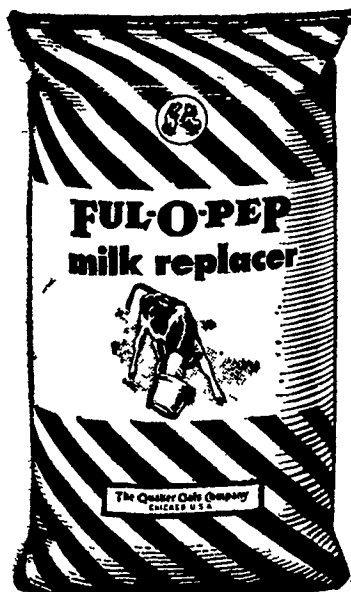

RED MEAT PRODUCTION UP SEVEN PERCENT

Commercial production of red meat in both the state and nation in October increased over year earlier levels according to the State Crop Reporting Service.

The Pennsylvania total, 88 million pounds, was approximately 7 percent more than the amount produced in October 1965. October production in the nation totaled 2,824 million pounds, up 6 percent from a year earlier.

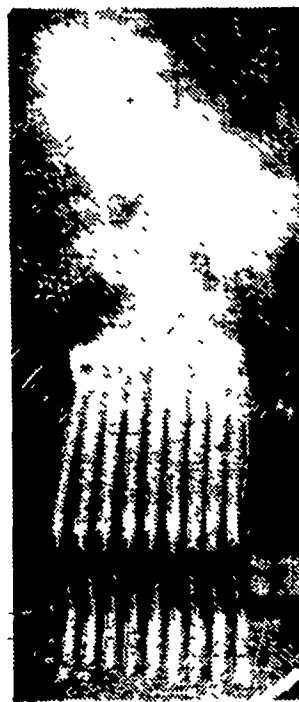
In the first 10 months of this year, U. S. production totaled 26,364 million pounds, 4 percent more than in the comparable period last year. Pennsylvania's 10-month total, 821 million pounds, is approximately 3 percent above 1965 output.
