his farming program is concentrated around sheep production. He has 35 registered Shropshire breeding ewes and 52 fattening lambs. He also has hay projects.

Ronald has done considerable show work with his sheep and had the grand champion junior market lamb at the 1964 Pennsylvania Livestock Exposition.

His plans for the future include a partnership with his father in a laying hen operation.

### RONALD MULL

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Mull of Ephrata R1, Ronald is a senior at Ephrata High School.

He serves as sentinel in the Cloister FFA Chapter, and was a delegate to the 1966 national FFA convention.

Ronald's farming program includes projects in swine — two registered Yorkshire sows and 23 market hogs — hay, corn, and tobacco. He was named grand champion showman at the county FFA hog show.

Following graduation, Ronald plans to work at a local feed mill.

### MARVIN L. WEAVER

A senior at Pequea Valley High School, Marvin is the 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Enos N. Weaver of Kinzers R1.

He serves as reporter for his local FFA chapter, and attended the national convention in 1965. He was winner of the Sear's gilt in his sophomore year, and holds the Red Rose Farmer degree.

Marvin has served as chapter representative to Inter-State Milk Producers Cooperative meeting, and as delegate to the county FFA chapter.

His current farming program includes dairy cows and heifers, tobacco, Landrace sows and gilts, fattening swine, and laying hens.

Marvin plans to stay on the farm after graduation. He will increase his farming program, and hopes eventually to farm in partnership with his father.

## JACOB L. STOLTZFUS

Jacob is a senior at Pequea Valley High School, 17-years-old, and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy K. Stoltzfus of Narvon R2.

He is vice president of the local FFA chapter, and has served on many chapter committees.

He placed 13th in FFA state dairy judging in June. In county livestock judging, he placed first, and was fifth in total judging points.

Jacob is a member of the wrestling and track teams at Pequea Valley High School.

After graduation, he will go to work with his father on the home farm.

### J. EDWIN ROHRER

Ed is the 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. F. Edwin Rohrer, Paradise R1. He is a senior at Pequea Valley High School, and serves as secretary of his local FFA chapter.
