Prices held unchanged on light hens in Penna, prices reflect condemnation deductions and no producer truck loading incentives Offerings light for movement the next two weeks, ample to occasionally excessive by the end of the month. Some supplemental shipments again delayed from New York State and New England due to Tuesday's snowstorm in those sections Demand for heavy hens light Offerings were fully adequate and readily available in some instances Prices paid at farm: Light Hens 6-7 1/4, M 6 1/2-7c, Heavy Hens 15-15 1/2c.

Non-contractual, inter-company offerings fully adequate for the light overall buying interest On flocks subject to hand grading by buyers, prices were 29 1/2-30c for small volume movement On straight run movement most processing buyers were taking a wait and see attitude following moderate activity last week Some unsettledness developed following of-

ferings at attractive prices for shipment from N.C. & Ohio. Isolate prior commitment noted, however on 11-13# hens for movement into early April at 32c per lb.

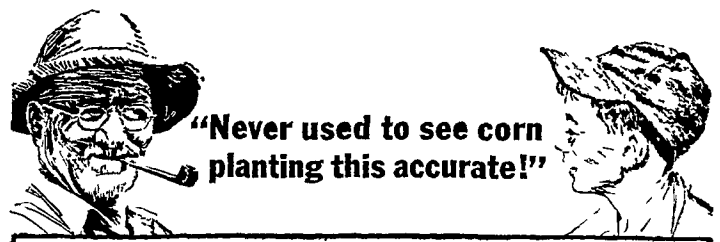

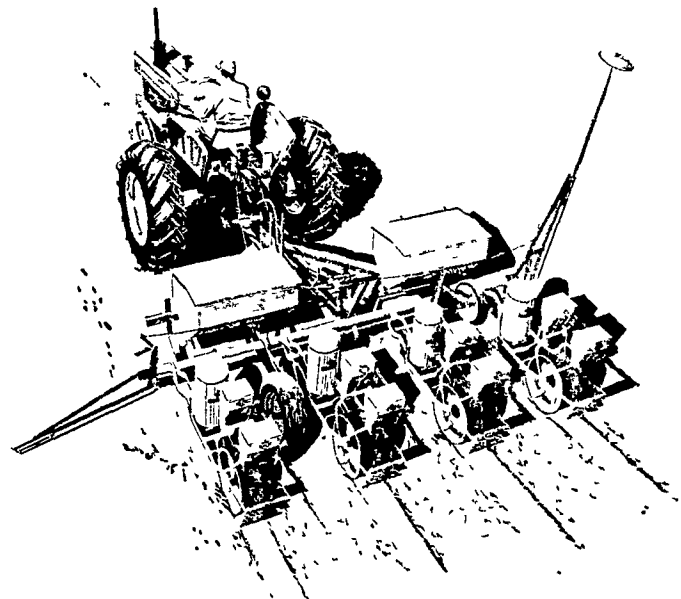
