Umble Holstein Joins Ranks Of "Bucket Busters"

BRATTLEBORO, Vermont—The 300th registered Holstein cow to exceed 100 tons of milk produced on official test in her lifetime has been announced by Holstein Friesian Association of America. The milestone bucket-buster is Swampy Hollow Lauxmont Molly, owned by John M. Umble, of Atglen.

"Molly's" actual lifetime credits stand at 204,484 pounds of milk and 7,433 pounds of butterfat, produced in 4,882 days since she became two years of age. The 15-year-old cow was bred and developed in the Umble herd. She was sired by Lauxmont Admiral Lucifer and out of the dam Darlane Piebe Segis. In her career with the Umble herd, "Molly" has produced 12 registered offspring, seven of them daughters.

In crossing the 100-ton production frontier, "Molly" exemplifies the dairyman's goal: to breed high producing cows that have longevity. To achieve this "iron grandma" status, a registered Holstein cow comes into production early in life, maintains a regular calving schedule and has the physical conformation that is less prone to injury, the Association notes.

At nine years, one month of age, "Molly" started her highest lactation record, which went 338 days to total 19,860 pounds of milk and 712 pounds of butterfat on a 2X milking schedule.

Umble, a Chester County dairyman, has been an active member of Holstein Friesian Association of America since 1949. The lactation average for his herd during 1966 was 16,093 pounds of milk and 636 pounds of butterfat on 37 completed records, mature equivalent basis.

Among the outstanding registered Holsteins bred and developed by Umble is the Gold Medal sire, Swampy Hollow Pabst Leader.
