

## Pennsylvania Participates In National Egg Industry Campaign

**HARRISBURG** — Pennsylvania is participating in a national milestone event in one of the egg industry's most successful campaigns in the past 10 years, according to Earl Hess of Ephrata, the eastern chairman for the Egg Sell-Abition.

The 1,000,000th hard-cooked egg in the "Golden Goodness of Eggs" campaign will be handed to a consumer in a two-week sweepstakes, April 1-15, in the greater N.Y. metropolitan area, and that recipient will win an all-expense paid, two-week vacation for two in London, Paris and Rome, awarded by Hess and Clark, division of Richardson-Merrell, Inc.

On March 31, gaily decorated vehicles from several participating states will be welcomed at the Jersey City exit of the New Jersey Turnpike by William J. Flanagan, executive director of the New Jersey Turnpike Authority. The vehicles will proceed into New York City. Participating in these ceremonies and throughout the day will be (from Pennsylvania) William R. Myer, Myers-town, president, Pennsylvania Poultry Federation, Donna Heagy, Lebanon, Pennsylvania Poultry Queen, Ruth Konhaus, NEPPCO Princess, representing the Northeastern Poultry Producers Council, and Miss Phyllis S. Moffett, executive secretary of the Pennsylvania Poultry Federation.

### Sessions Scheduled To Measure Deer Antlers

Two deer antler measuring sessions have been scheduled in the state for Sunday, April 9 by the Pennsylvania Game Commission.

The measuring sessions will be held at Lincoln Glange, along Route 26 about five miles south of Marklesburg, Huntingdon County from noon to 5 p.m., and at the Army in Honesdale Wayne County, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Measuring sessions are also scheduled for Sunday, April 2, at Carlisle Fish and Game Clubhouse, noon to 5 p.m., at the Mt. Joy Sportsmen's Club, 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. and at the Bradford County Courthouse, Towanda 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Antlers must have been taken in the commonwealth, and trophies taken by both resident and non-resident hunters are eligible. The program is a public service of the Game Commission and no charge is made for measuring.

Entry forms are available at all measuring stations. On the entry form the owner certifies that the deer which he is entering in the Pennsylvania Deer Records Program was taken in lawful chase in Pennsylvania.

The following rules govern this contest:

- 1 Only Yearling bucks or greater will be measured.
- 2 Split or repaired skulls will not be accepted.
- 3 Antlers may not show removed or repaired points.
- 4 Trophy was taken in compliance with the Pennsylvania Game Law.
- 5 The Pennsylvania Game Commission shall not be responsible for any trophy lost or damaged.
- 6 The Pennsylvania Game Commission retains the right to reject any entry.
- 7 Trophies measured in a previous Game Commission contest may not be re-entered.
- 8 All measurements of the judges will be final.

In a proclamation issued by Lester F. Burlein, chairman, Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission, the Pennsylvania Turnpike was named "GATEWAY TO AMERICA'S EGG BASKET" for the day yesterday. The proclamation noted that Pennsylvania producers and marketers rely on the turnpike for fast, convenient and dependable transportation, and as a link in the chain of arteries which annually speed 500,000 quality eggs, produced in Pennsylvania under a state program of grading and marketing, to the New York metropolitan markets.

Later that day, 10,000 hard-cooked eggs provided by the Egg Marketing Association of Pennsylvania were distributed to the crowds at Rockefeller Center in New York City by "Egg Queens" of the various states. Assisting in this distribution were six Future Farmers of America from Ephrata High School. Also taking part in the festivities were "Miss Nutritia Egg", a five-foot tall fiberglass character developed by the Market Development Division of the Bureau of Markets, Penna. Dept. of Agriculture, for the Pennsylvania Egg Marketing Association.

Also cooperating in the program were the Morton Salt Company and the Poultry & Egg National Board.

### DOG TRAINING SEASON CLOSED TILL AUGUST 1

The dog training season in Pennsylvania will be closed from midnight March 31 until August 1, the Game Commission reminded sportsmen this week. Certain counties where petitions have been filed to permit fox hunting with dogs will be closed for only sixty days during the four-month period.

### Agribusiness Program Starts At Ephrata H.S.

Ten senior vocational agriculture students at Ephrata High School have begun a seven-week agribusiness training program as an occupational work experience.

Vo-ag teacher Lewis C. Ayers explained that the students work four hours a day, five days a week on the jobs. The period began Tuesday and ends May 12.

"Students enrolled in the program attend regular school classes in the morning and report after lunch to their agribusiness jobs," Ayers said. "The

on-job training provides the students with the opportunity to learn by doing in the most practical sense."

ersville Equipment Co., Ronald Mull; Galen Hall Golf Course, Kermit Zimmerman; Diffendall Landscape Service, Ephrata R2, Barry Sensenig; and Organic Plant Foods Co., Lancaster, Randal Klme.

This is the second year for the agri-business training program at Ephrata High School.

Was the first year successful? "Eleven boys were out on jobs and nine of them were offered full time employment," Ayers reported.

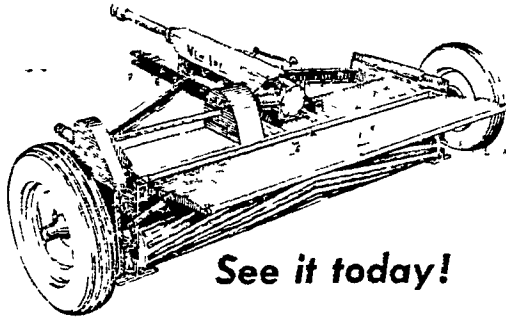
