### Milk Price Hike Urged By 21 Dairy Co-Ops

Northeast Dairy Cooperative Federation announced Tuesday it was joining with 20 other cooperative organizations in New York, New Jersey and New England in a petition to Secretary of Agriculture Freeman to raise farm milk prices for hard pressed dairy farmers.

Robert C. Forsythe, Northeast Federation service division manager, said the petition was calling for both immediate emergency relief and a hearing for long term relief extending into 1970.

The emergency relief request he said calls for the Secretary to suspend the supply-demand section of federal milk order 2 so as to increase the Class I fluid milk price by 30 to 35 cents per hundred pounds for the months of May, June and July. This, he said, would mean an increase of 15 to 18 cents per hundred pounds in the farm price for those months.

The hearing proposal aimed at long term price increases asked for certain changes in federal order 2 which would result in Class I fluid price increases for New York-New Jersey dairy farmers of about 40 to 45 cents per hundred pounds, or about one cent per quart. This proposed increase is being asked to take effect August 1, 1967 and extend through January 1, 1970.

The petition also asked that the New England federal order fluid milk price be pegged at

its present rate for the months of May, June, and July.

It also ties the New York-New Jersey federal order fluid price to within 10 cents per hundred pounds of the New England order price from August 1, 1967 through January 1, 1970.
