### PSU Agr. & Home Econ. Mark 75th Year For Correspondence Courses

Correspondence courses in agriculture and home economics at Penn State University mark their 75th year in existence this year, according to university officials. During that time, some 200,000 people have taken advantage of this unique educational program.

The courses offered today number 88, and range over such subjects as Farm Management, Cost Accounting, Farm Law, Flower Arrangement, etc.

Several new courses added are Beekeeping, Small Greenhouses, and a revised course in House Plants.

### Eggs And Meat Prices To Farmers Lower; Up On Grains And Apples

**HARRISBURG** — The average price Penna. farmers received for a dozen of eggs in March was 39 cents a dozen, three cents more than in February the Crop Reporting Service has announced. The average price a year ago was 44 cents.

The hundredweight price of lambs rose \$1.40 and turkeys brought the farmer 28 cents a

pound, up two cents from February.

Meat animal prices were mostly lower with hogs, slaughter cows, calves and sheep declining. Hogs at \$19.30 were \$1.40 lower than in February and \$6.50 below the price in March a year ago. The steers and heifers March price of \$23.70 was \$2.20 under a year ago.

Crop prices were mixed with corn and wheat going up slightly in price while barley, soybeans and hay dropped slightly. Corn at \$1.54 a bushel was two cents above the February level and the highest since September. Wheat, which gained four cents, was worth \$1.62 a bushel to the farmer. Apples for fresh market, primarily from controlled atmosphere storage, brought \$3.80 a bushel, the highest on record.
