1 can (4 oz.) sliced mushrooms  
1 cup milk  
Combine flour, salt and pepper, coat meat with mixture. Reserve remaining flour mixture. In large covered skillet melt butter; brown meat about 10 minutes on each side. Add onion and mushrooms with liquid; cover and simmer 20 minutes or until veal is tender. Remove meat to warm platter and keep warm. Stir 1 tablespoon flour mixture into drippings in pan. Remove from heat, gradually stir in milk. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until thickened. Cook 2 additional minutes, pour over meat. Garnish with parsley. Makes 6 servings.

**SAVORY LEMON LAMB SHANKS**

1/2 clove garlic  
4 to 6 lamb shanks  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
3 tablespoons flour  
1 teaspoon paprika  
2 tablespoons shortening  
1/2 cup water  
1 bay leaf, crushed  
4 peppercorns  
2 tablespoons grated lemon peel  
1/2 cup lemon juice  
1 lemon, cut into wedges  
Cut garlic in small pieces, make small gash in each shank and insert piece of garlic. Season shanks with salt and pepper; roll in flour blended with paprika. In heavy skillet or

**Herbs Give Vegetables Special Taste**

Herbs improve the flavor of vegetables, but will overpower rather than enhance if not used sparingly.

Use one fourth to one half teaspoon of most dried herbs or one tablespoon of fresh chopped herbs for four servings of vegetables.

To add herbs, heat desired amount in melted butter or margarine. Then add this mixture to cooked vegetables.

Bay leaves can add variety to carrots, potatoes, beets, and tomatoes.

Seive tasty peas, potatoes, spinach, and tomatoes by adding basil or oregano.

A small amount of mustard can improve the flavor of brussels sprouts, squash, asparagus, broccoli, and potatoes.

Dill may be used with broccoli, carrots, peas, potatoes, or cauliflower.

Add a gourmet touch to carrots, peas, and spinach with marjoram.

Thyme combines well with potatoes, tomatoes, and carrots.

Tarragon may be used with asparagus or tomatoes.

Make peas and green beans more appetizing by adding sage, rosemary, or savory.

Consider color, flavor, and strength when buying herbs.

The aromatic value of herbs, which depends on fine

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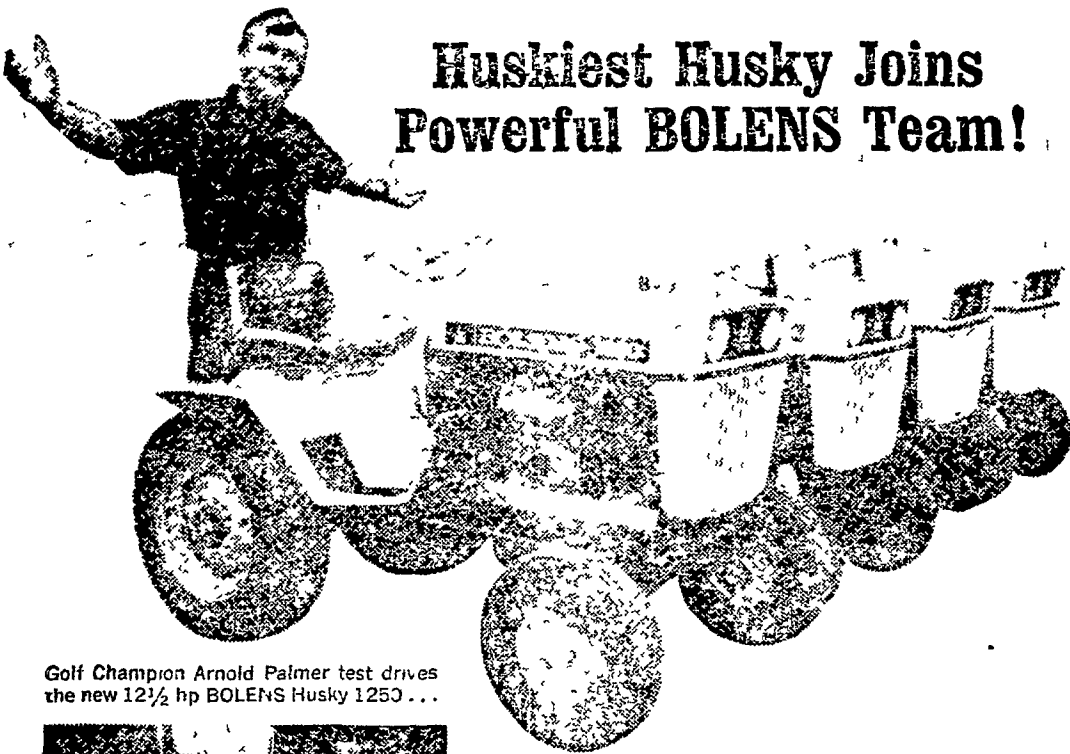
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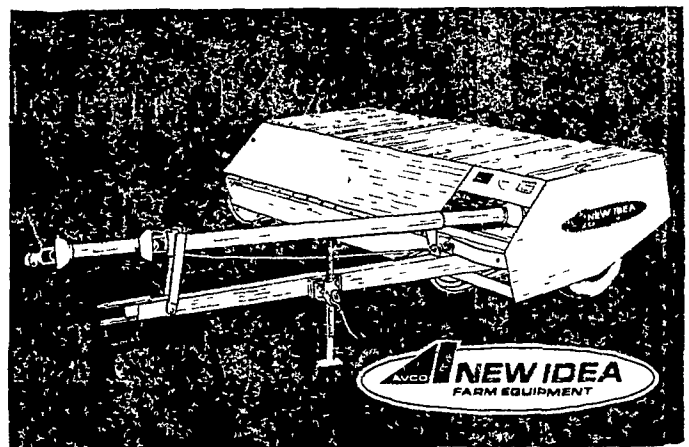
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
