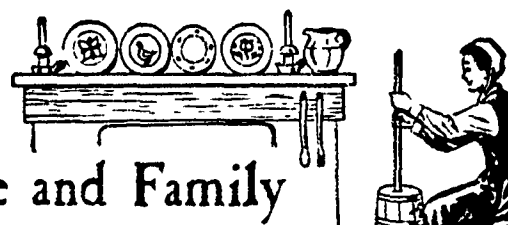

Services A Reliable Drycleaner Provides

A reliable drycleaner carefully inspects garments before they are returned to you. Depending on time and equipment, as many as 26 items are checked.

Clothes returned from a reputable drycleaner are free of shine or seam impressions, crooked seams or hemlines, creases around waistline, gathers pressed flat, fabric stretched between buttons or buttons mashed into fabric.

Storage Limit On Canned Foods Varies
Commercially canned foods require a minimum of care to maintain their quality during storage.

Store canned foods in a dry place where the temperature won't go above 70 degrees or below freezing.

Many foods remain safe and acceptable for long periods of time. But there is a maximum storage limit for some foods.

Most canned fruits and vegetables can be kept up to 18 months after buying.

Berries, sour cherries, citrus fruit juices, tomatoes, and sauerkraut keep top quality for only 6 months.

You can store canned meat and poultry up to 18 months, canned fish up to a year, condensed meat and vegetable soups up to 8 months.

Evaporated milk and nonfat dry milk packaged in metal containers keep their quality for 6 months.

Store hydrogenated fats, vegetable oils, canned nuts, instant puddings, cereal products, canned bouillon, and bouillon cubes for only a year.

Vacuum-packed coffee, tea, and instant cocoa will keep their quality up to 18 months.

Sugar and salt keep indefinitely.

Carpet And Rug Care Tips

When carpet or rug pile is crushed down because of furniture pressure or constant walking, try a hot iron over a damp cloth or a steam iron on the spots. Let the steam do the work — don't press the iron down on the pile. While the pile is slightly moist, brush up the spots gently.

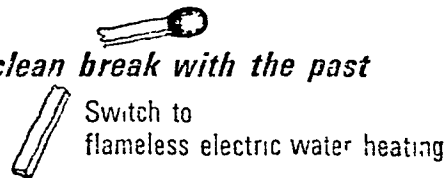
