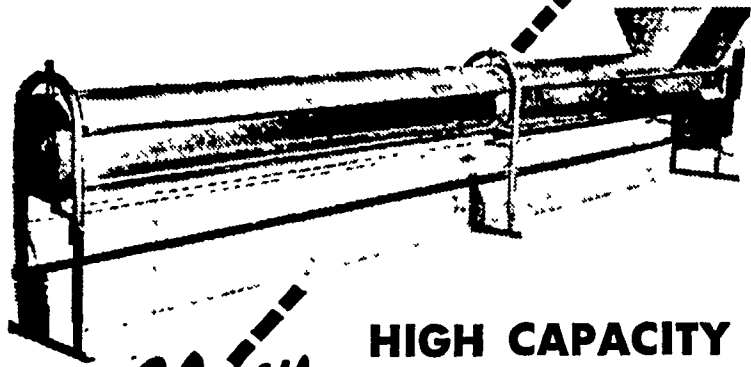

Some parts of rugs and carpets get harder wear than others. For better looks and longer life, give these heavily traveled areas a breathing spell. Move the furniture and reverse the rugs from time to time and you'll distribute wear on them. When you can't reverse the floor covering, arrange the furniture so you get different traffic lanes.

For Your Information

Keep sponges clean and they'll last longer. Wash them thoroughly after each use to remove the dirt particles which are more damaging than the actual rubbing you do with the sponges. Wash sponges in hot detergent suds, then rinse several times.

You can remove ink spots from ballpoint pens from washable fabrics by quick rinsing in clear water and washing in soapsuds.

Local Holstein Herd Classified For Type

According to the Holstein-Friesian Association of America, the Holstein herd at the Red Rose Research Center, owned by John W. Eshelman & Sons, Lancaster, has recently been scored for body type by a staff classifier. Many of the animals also received ratings under the new Descriptive Type Classification program which went into effect this year, the association noted.

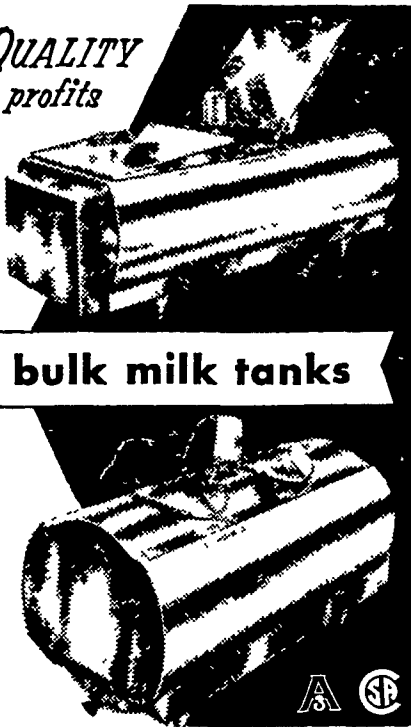
Twenty-four animals in the Eshelman herd were classified; six rated "Very Good", 13 "Good Plus", and five "Good", the report stated.

Information made available from the classification program is published as detailed reference material for Holstein breeder use in all parts of the country, the association added.

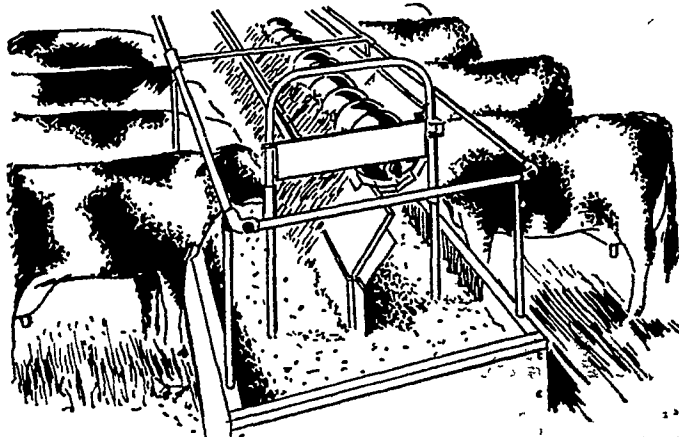
