Construction To Begin On F & H Center—Construction on the Lancaster County Farm & Home Center is scheduled to begin late this summer, according to an announcement this week (June 25) by Foundation president B. Snavely Garber.

The one-story masonry building will serve as headquarters for the farmers of Lancaster County, and will house the offices of the Agricultural Extension Service, the County ASCS, Soil Conservation Service, Farmers Home Administration, and the Lancaster County Superintendent of Schools.

Milk Order Legality Threatened—The complicated and confusing milk picture in Pennsylvania became ever more so this week (June 9) with the decision of the US Supreme Court in the case of two Pennsylvania milk processors.

By a vote of 6 to 1, the court upheld the claim of the two handlers selling milk in the New York-New Jersey area. It said the USDA had no right to require outsiders to pay money into a pool to be divided among farmers normally supplying milk to the area.

The decision of the court poses a threat to the entire structure of federal milk marketing orders since 31 of the nation's 83 milk marketing areas have similar regulations.

The ruling involved an appeal by Suncrest Farms, Inc., Bethlehem, and the Lehigh Valley Cooperative Farmers, Inc., Allentown, both of whom sought not to make payments into the pool.

Snader Wins 4-H Strawberry Roundup—Jerry Snader, a nine-year veteran in 4-H Club work, won his first blue ribbon in strawberry competition this week (June 9) with his Cat-skill exhibit.

Snader, 18-year old son of Mrs. Eva Snader of Ephrata R1, took honors in both exhibit and project book phases of the strawberry club roundup.

Snader's win marked the first time in four years that the competition was not won by one of the children of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Overgaard of Lancaster R4.

Judging the exhibits at the Hotel Brunswick in Lancaster was Carl Bittner, extension horticulture specialist.

Two Countians Named State FFA Champs—Of the 51 Future Farmers from Lancaster County who competed in contests this week (June 16) at the state convention, 29 came home with prizes.

Two of the blue-jacketed farm boys took the state's top awards. John Hess, Jr., Mannheim, won the top title in land

judging, and Harold Brubaker, Mount Joy R1, did the same in dairy cattle judging.

Eight other boys from the county took gold medals in their respective contests.
