

Bethlehem, Agway Set Limestone Agreement

Bethlehem Steel Corporation recently announced that it has entered into an agreement with Agway, Inc., Syracuse, N.Y., to furnish the northeastern agricultural cooperative with an important byproduct of its quarrying operations.

Shipments to Agway of vari-

ous types of this byproduct—commonly known as agricultural limestone—are expected to increase over the next few years to about 200,000 tons annually, Bethlehem said.

The limestone product will be made available through Agway dealers in Delaware, Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and some areas of New York.

Three Bethlehem Steel quar-

ries are involved in the production and shipment of these high-grade agricultural liming materials. They are located at Hanover, Annville and King of Prussia, all in Pennsylvania.

Most of the agricultural material produced at these quarries results from making fluxing ingredients for the steel corporation's blast furnaces and open hearths located many miles away.

The agricultural liming materials will be furnished to Agway mostly in bulk for direct spreading to fields. Specifications will vary slightly between quarries but will fall well within the desirable limits recommended by state and federal authorities.

NFU Lauds Dairy Import Limits

National president of Farmers Union Tony T. Dechant said this week that "the action of President Johnson to invoke Section 22 to limit sharply dairy imports gives dairy farmers renewed hope for an improvement in prices and more net return"

Dechant, who met with President Johnson recently to discuss the dairy import problem said that "the President, in cutting imports to an annual level of 1.011 billion pounds of milk equivalent, has demonstrated his concern over the high cost of dairy production and has made clear his desire to help dairy farmers increase their return on mounting investment in herd and equipment."

While recognizing the President's action as an "important stopgap measure" Dechant said that "a more permanent solution than invoking Section 22 is urgently needed. Therefore, Farmers Union will continue to seek Congressional approval of the Dairy Import Act of 1967 introduced by Senator William Proxmire and which now has 57 Senators and 177 House sponsors.

"The U.S. Department of Agriculture has given important support in the action of the President," Dechant said, "and Secretary Freeman has given me his assurance that steps will be taken immediately to curb the four-billion pound annual level at which imports are running in 1967."

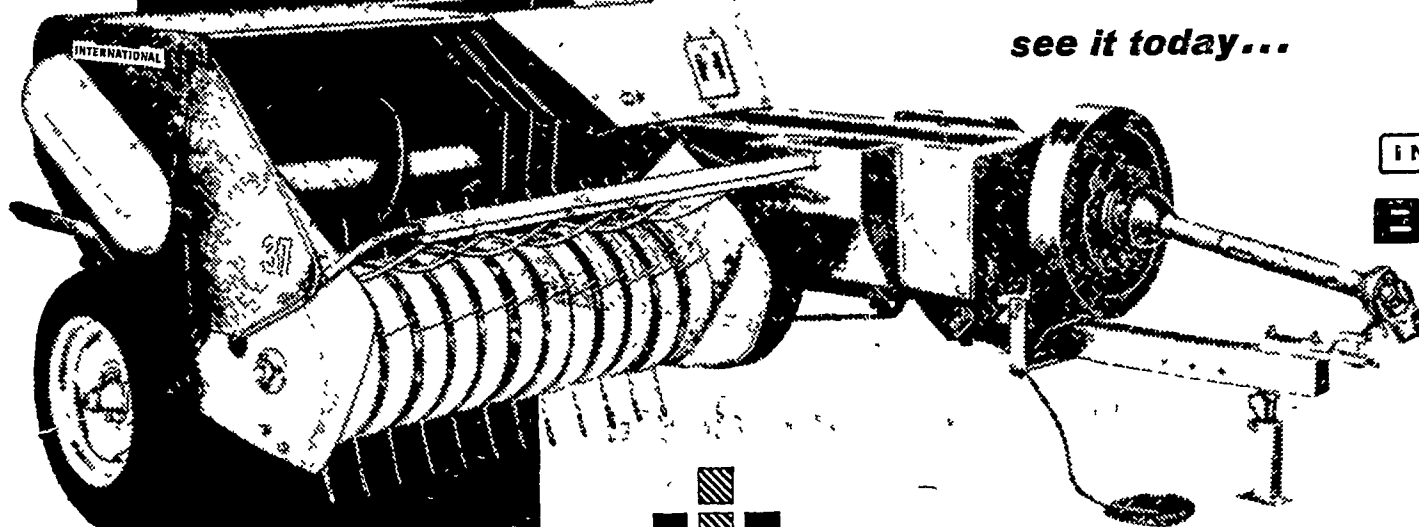
