average prices were substantially lower. The grand champion brought 49 cents a pound, compared to 71 cents last year. The reserve brought 28.85 this year compared to 41 cents a pound last year. The average price for all animals sold was 23.85 cents this year — 28.24 cents last year. The animals were auctioned through the

Lancaster Livestock Exchange with Walter Dunlap & Sons, Inc. buying the champion. The reserve champion was purchased by Hervitz Packing Co., Harrisburg.

TROPHY ROTATES

Despite Fisher's outstanding efforts, the rotating trophy which goes to the chapter scoring the most points at each year's show returned to Cloister, following a one-year absence during which it resided with the Grassland Chapter. 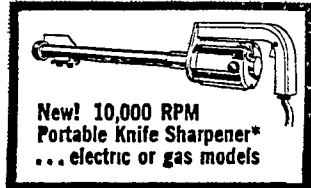
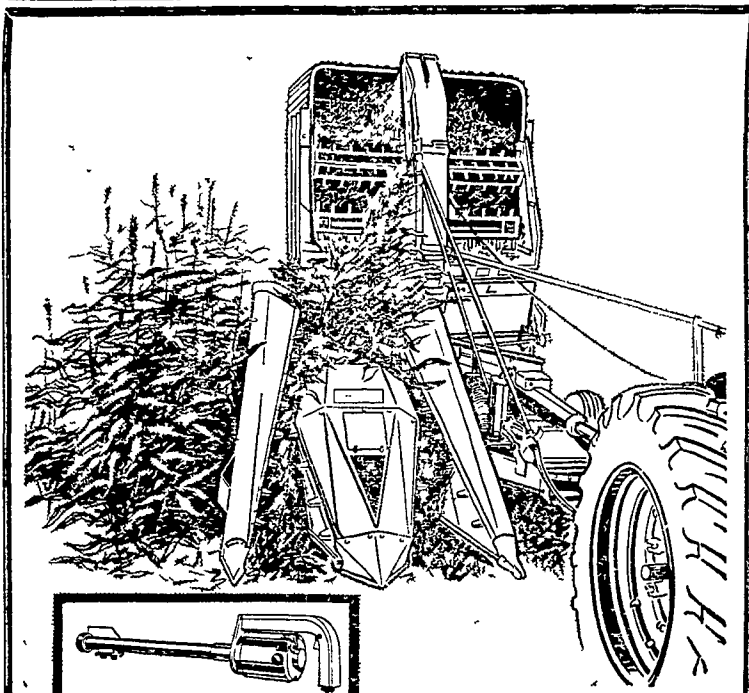

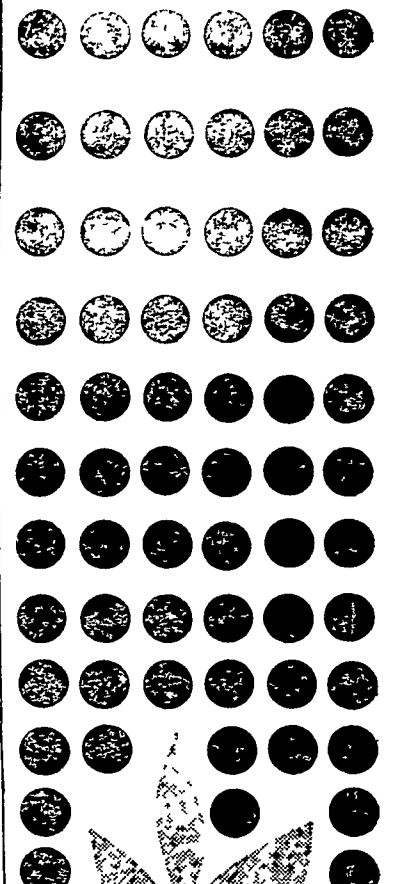
