While in the United States Correy would like to learn about Agricultural Extension work (it's role in the community development and the 4-H Structure and programs); Other farmer organizations (cooperatives, clubs, etc.) and Agricultural practices (pasture and range management, wheat production and sheep production).

The International Farm Youth Exchange is an exchange program of 4-H alumni and other young adults of the United States with rural youth of other countries. IFYE is conducted by the National 4-H Club Foundation in behalf of the Cooperative Extension Service of the State Land-Grant Universities and the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Since its beginning in 1946, 69 countries have participated in the program with the United States. In 1967, approximately 200 young people and 35 countries will participate in the exchange.

The 1967 exchange with Australia is in cooperation with the Australian Council of Rural Youth. Two delegates from the United States are visiting Australia, while two exchanges from Australia are visiting the United States.

Correy's exchange is made possible through financial sponsorship of local 4-H, business and civic groups in cooperation with national sponsorship by the Ford Motor Company Fund.
