LIVE HENS

Prices on light type hens held unchanged, heavy type ranged unchanged to 1/2c higher. In instances, bids as high as 13c for well feathered small lots went unfilled. Demand fair and less aggressive on light type hens as offerings generally increased in all areas. Interest in heavy type spotty ranging fair to very good. Offerings ample in New Jersey to barely adequate in Pennsylvania. Prices paid at farm: Light type hens 4-6, mostly 5 1/4-5 1/2c; Heavy type hens 11-12 1/2, mostly 11-11 1/4c.

TURKEYS

Demand fair to occasionally good on young hens from processors preparing to fill fresh iced packed needs for next week's Hebrew Holiday period. Interest only fair on young toms. Overall offerings generally ample, however certain sizes occasionally barely adequate. Movement heavy on contractual agreements with shortage of labor a limiting factor at processing plants.

Broiler and fryer live prices averaged 10.76 cents per pound this week. Prices paid during the week ranged from a high of 12 cents per pound on Monday to a low of 9.7 cents per pound on Thursday. Total sales for the week total-

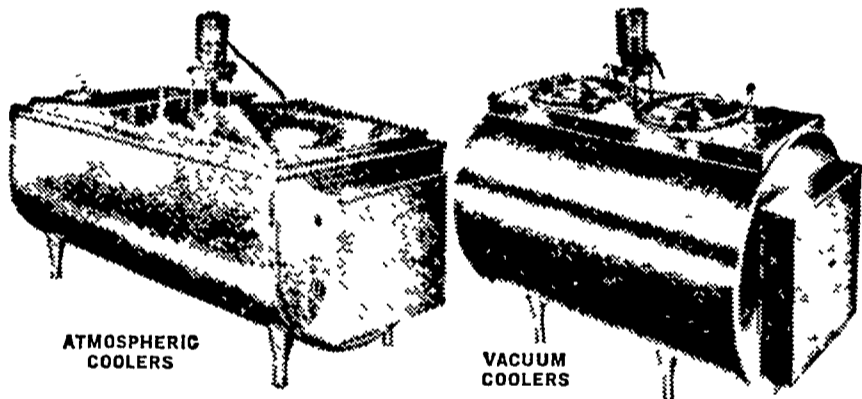
