Poultrymen Face Battle In Urban Developments

HARRISBURG — Poultrymen will have to give up any "public-be-damned" notions they may harbor if they are to copy with the problems of an ever-expanding urban population.

This was the consensus of a three-man panel of experts that sifted the problems of odor and flies from poultry farms that wind up in the center or on the fringes of new housing developments.

The discussion fired the opening gun on three days of educational sessions, displays and competition at the annual exposition and convention of the Northeastern Poultry Producers Council (NEPPCO) in the Farm Show Building here.

Charles Shuman To Speak At Farmers' Meet

Charles B. Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, will be the speaker for the Lancaster County Farmers' Association Annual Meeting, which will be held in Lancaster Tuesday, Oct. 17, at the Holiday Inn, according to an announcement made by Noah Wenger, Association president.

Each year the Lancaster Farmers' Association meets to discuss local policy and make policy suggestions to the Pennsylvania Farmers' Association, an affiliate of the American Farm Bureau Federation. The Lancaster organization has 1,030 family memberships in the local unit.

President Shuman became president of the American Farm Bureau, the largest general farm organization in the world, in December 1954, and has been re-elected president for six additional two-year terms.

He is a stock and grain farmer and lives near Sullivan, Illinois, where he began his work in the Farm Bureau organization. Shuman actively participates with his three sons (Continued on Page 7)
