## Keep Knives In Good Condition

Knives stay in good condition through reasonable care, rather than frequent sharpening. This means:

Cutting on a board. Protecting a knife in storage, not storing it with other tools.

Never use it to pry off lids, open packages, or sharpen pencils.

Use an old, inexpensive knife for rough jobs.

Never use a knife to open cans - it's unsafe.

Heat is harmful to knife blades. Too hot water can spoil steel, and the handle of a knife is more delicate than the blade.

Keep knives clean and sanitary and dry thoroughly before storing.

Use a cleaver to cut bones - not a butcher knife. Bones can dull sharp knives.

## Some Convenience Foods Cost Less

There are some convenience

foods that cost less than foods you prepare from "scratch" at home. They include: instant coffee, canned or frozen orange juice, canned red sour cherries, canned or frozen lima beans, canned or frozen corn, canned or frozen peas, canned spaghetti, and devils food cake mix.

## Curtains for Less?

Check the dress goods counters for possibilities when you choose fabrics for curtains.

Dress fabrics are colorful and exciting in design and texture.

They are usually available in varied widths and fibers.

Cost per yard is less than what you usually find in drapery fabrics.
