The Lancaster County Farm-City Week Banquet will be held Thursday evening at Dutch Town and Country Inn. All farmers are urged to attend.

M. M. Smith, Agricultural County Agent, said this week, "The importance of this banquet cannot be over stressed. For the seventh time in recent years, the business and agriculture communities will be drawn together as a group to discuss mutual problems and activities.
