G. A. Biggs Says Farmers' To Use Team Approach

YORK, Nov. 7 — The farmers of Pennsylvania need a stronger voice in legislative affairs, stated G. A. Biggs, president of the Pennsylvania Farmers' Association in his annual address to the delegates at the organization's 17th annual meeting opening here today.

"We are going to initiate a team approach in our public affairs program at the state legislature." President Biggs reported. "In past years, we have been able to stop legislation relatively easily, but we have difficulty in getting our legislation through the state General Assembly."


The farm leader blamed the lack of man-power for creating this problem for the Pennsylvama Farmers' Association.

The PFA held its 17th annual meeting Wednesday, Thursday and Friday to consider and adopt policy for the coming year.




