

## Reduction In Beef Imports Urged By Charolais Breeders

Drastic reductions in import quotas of fresh and canned

beef, especially from countries which have embargoes against live cattle from the United States, have been urged by American-International Charolais Association.

J. Scott Henderson, execu-

tive secretary of the nation's fourth largest beef breed association, declared "it doesn't make good sense to permit such large amounts of beef from those countries to compete within our domestic market when we are not permitted to ship cattle to those countries."

A resolution adopted by the association's board of directors specifically mentioned Australia and New Zealand and "any other country" as prohibiting U. S. exports of live cattle to those countries. Yet, these countries, Henderson said, represent most of the total imports of beef into this country.

The resolution also pointed out that butcher cattle in the United States are at about 80% of parity, at a time when pro-

duction costs are at an all time high. Also, it pointed out that an hour of industrial wages will buy more beef at the meat counter than at any time in the history of this country.

"This unrealistic situation is due largely to the policy of our government which has given a large percentage of our beef market to foreign beef, which has been produced at a small fraction of the cost of producing American beef," the resolution stated.

"This unfair and un-American competition threatens the entire future of the American cattle producer," Henderson continued.

The resolution, carrying

unanimous action of the board urges Congress to "pass legislation at this session of Congress, drastically reducing the quota of fresh and canned beef to be imported from Australia, New Zealand or any other country that prohibits our exports of live cattle into those countries, and which is allowed to compete in this country with our home-produced beef."

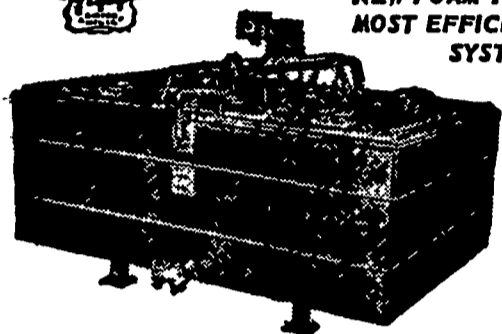

## Simulated Milk Products Being Investigated

The Penna. Department of Agriculture has started an investigation of simulated milk products that are being processed and marketed in several sections of the state.

They are similar to products recently introduced in other states, particularly California and New York, according to State Agriculture Secretary Leland H. Bull.

The products, known elsewhere as "imitation milk," or "milk substitutes," generally contain vegetable fats, Secretary Bull said. Some, he added, also contain powdered skim milk.

"I have instructed state food agents and milk sanitarians to obtain samples of such products being sold in Pennsylvania so that we can determine what ingredients are being used in their preparation," Secretary Bull said.

"Our first concern is to protect the public by making sure all ingredients in these products meet approved standards and are fit for human consumption."

Secretary Bull said his office has received numerous reports about these products. These include inquiries from food processors and dairy operators concerning regulations—such as licensing, registration, labeling and packaging—that apply to the manufacture and sale of these products.

"Examination of the products to identify ingredients, their accurate labeling, and whether they are of a quality suitable for human consumption will help us determine the answers to these questions," Secretary Bull explained. He said also he will confer with the Attorney General's office regarding regulations and procedures that may apply to the manufacture and sale of the new products in Pennsylvania.
