

Grange Members Hold Meeting Next Week

Harrisburg — An estimated 1,500 Pennsylvanians, from nearly all counties, will leave this weekend for Syracuse, N. Y., for the centennial convention of the National Grange, a 10-day event.

John W. Scott, Harrisburg, state master and national secretary of the Grange, today said convention caravans from this and other states will halt in Gettysburg at noon on Sunday, Nov. 12, for the dedication of a plaque in honor of William Saunders, first national master who drew the plans for the Gettysburg National Cemetery. Governor Raymond P. Shafer will give the dedicatory address.

President Johnson, accompanied by Mrs. Johnson, on Monday afternoon will address the Syracuse meeting at which

National Master Herschel D. Newsom, Washington, will preside. The President will be presented by New York Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller. Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman will speak at a Grange agricultural dinner the following Saturday night, November 18. Guests will include State Agriculture Secretary Leland H. Bull. The Rev. Clarence Rahn, of Fleetwood, will speak Wednesday on Grange membership.

Nearly 1,000 Pennsylvanians will be among recipients of the seventh degree, climax to Grange ritual teaching, that will be conferred in four mass exemplifications.

Four individual and team winners in talent contests at the recent Pennsylvania State Grange session at Gettysburg will appear on the national convention stage. One of them, a Mercer county Pomona team, will exemplify degree work. Three others will compete in national talent finals. They are Linda Reitz, Schnecksville,
