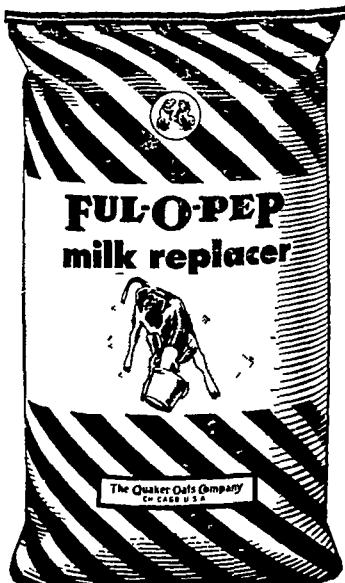

of democratic methods that retain for the farmer control over his own enterprise," he declared. And he commended Farm Bureau for working "for a farm program tending toward a free market price system and for the elimination of production controls"

Fulton devoted the major portion of his address to the Food for Peace program

"It is a temptation, with some appeal, for an agriculturally advanced, highly developed nation to think of going all out in expanding food production, pouring the excess in some abundance into hungry nations," he declared.

"But to follow this temptation would be to allow food aid to be used as a crutch . . . to tempt the hungry nations, in turn, to delay or neglect their own agricultural development . . . which alone can provide a permanent solution for the problem of hunger," he said.

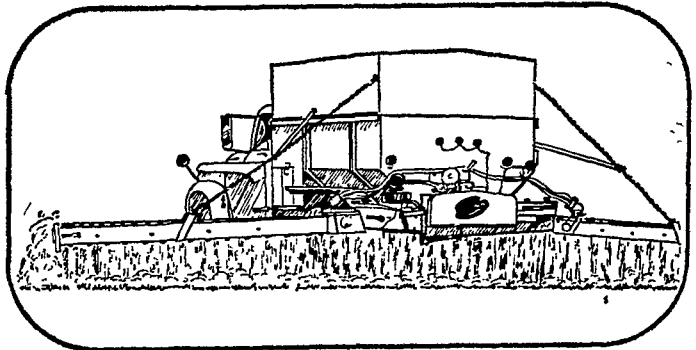
