### Furniture Terminology

**Traditional** — Great periods of furniture style reproduced or imitated. Every generation borrowed something from the past closer to contemporary than to any historical precedent.

**Reproduction** — A copy of an old piece of furniture of historic style. If it is accurate in all details, it is a replica; if it follows the general external form it is a reproduction.

**Adaptation** — A reproduction that preserves the spirit of the original piece which inspired it.

**Authentic** — genuine, an exact replica.  
**Style** — A distinctive manner of design, typical of any given time, place, person, or group.

### The Cost Of Snacking

A large share of your family's food money goes for potato chips, pretzels, and nuts.

Almost two billion dollars were spent in a recent year for snack foods.

Shelf space for snack foods at stores has increased 50 percent in length in the last three years, according to trade papers.

Snacks, like candy, are often bought on impulse. Bright packages, tantalizing new items, catchy names, and desire for approval of family and friends induce the purchase of many snack items.

### When Is Bread Fresh?

When you buy bread, how do you know it's fresh?

The familiar squeeze test is no longer reliable for detecting the freshness of bread.

Some new bread formulas contain softeners as an ingredient. These softeners keep bread soft for days.

And some compact loaves may be very fresh but because no softeners have been added they don't yield to the squeeze test.

### Arrange Furniture For

#### Senior Citizens

Consider comfort, convenience, and safety when you arrange furniture for a senior citizen. Because older persons aren't likely to change their

furniture arrangements often, you'll do well to plan an arrangement that will be satisfactory for a long time.

Plan traffic lanes through a room for comfort and safety.

Check that doors open away from traffic lanes and that furniture doesn't stick out into walking areas.

Leave plenty of room to walk around chairs, tables, and other furniture.

Plan furniture arrangements so the center of the room remains clear.

For safety's sake, avoid small stools, floor pillows, or scatter rugs.

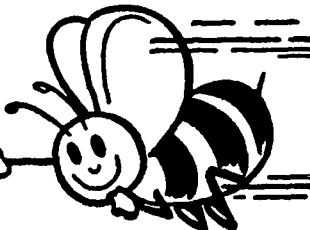

5 ingredients and mushroom mixture. Blend well. Pour into 6 greased individual casseroles. Combine cracker crumbs, cheese and anchovies. Add remaining 2 tablespoons butter, melted. Blend thoroughly. Sprinkle evenly over casseroles. Refrigerate until ready to heat and serve. If chilled for any length of time, let stand at room temperature before baking. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (350 degrees) 25 to 30 minutes or until golden. Garnish with lemon and parsley. Makes about 6 servings.

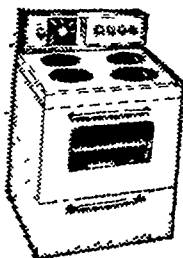
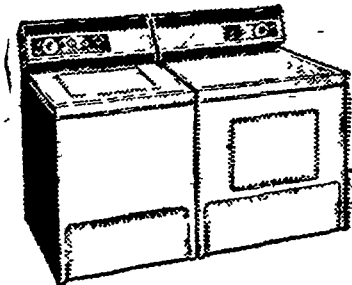
