Produce, Less Expense, and concluded with "The main trend is to cut costs while producing more"

Zimmerman recently went to the Soviet Union for the expressed purpose of personally evaluating church-state relationships and individual freedom in religious matters. To accomplish this he made his November 15-December 1, 1967 trip with only one other person, a minister from New Jersey and traveled by Russian jet and rode taxis as a regular tourist. In this way he found he could readily talk to common people on the streets.

He visited the American, Canadian and Cuban embassys in Moscow.

He said that older people still remember war and destruction in their own country. "This reflects in their thinking," he said. "They hate war and dread to think about it."

Zimmerman found the churches crowded with standing room only and people complaining if the preacher talked for less than two hours. He found churches which would normally accommodate 150 Americans taking care of 1000 members there.

Wages for farm workers are about the same as for industry, with a new incentive program being developed where the farm worker will receive a bonus according to his crop production. One of the problems they have had is that workers don't care how much they produce," he said.

Farm hands are paid about 100 rubles a month. A ruble is about equal to one dollar in purchasing power. The cost of living for the farm worker includes 10 rubles for rent and 80 rubles for food per month.

"Agriculture is by far their weakest point," Zimmerman said. "However, the people are well fed. There is no food rationing."
