Importance Of State Agriculture Shown In University Display

"Forestry for Living" was one of the themes at The Pennsylvania State University display at the 52nd Farm Show.

Pennsylvania's paper and other wood products are valued at \$13 billion per year Workers earn \$280 million making these products

Also 15 million Christmas trees and 100,000 gallons of maple syrup are produced in the state

Of Pennsylvania's 17 million acres of forest, 135 million

acres are privately owned.

The Penn State display showed that sales of logs and bolts produced in the state total \$50 million per year.

The importance of the farmer's contribution to the state's economy was also pinpointed in the display Pennsylvania farmers and their wives pay \$41 million in taxes and \$21 million in interest each year Expenses for feed, fertilizer, lime and seed are about \$300 million. Other costs amount to nearly \$400 million.

Farm families throughout the nation spend at least \$33 billion a year for the same things that city people buy.

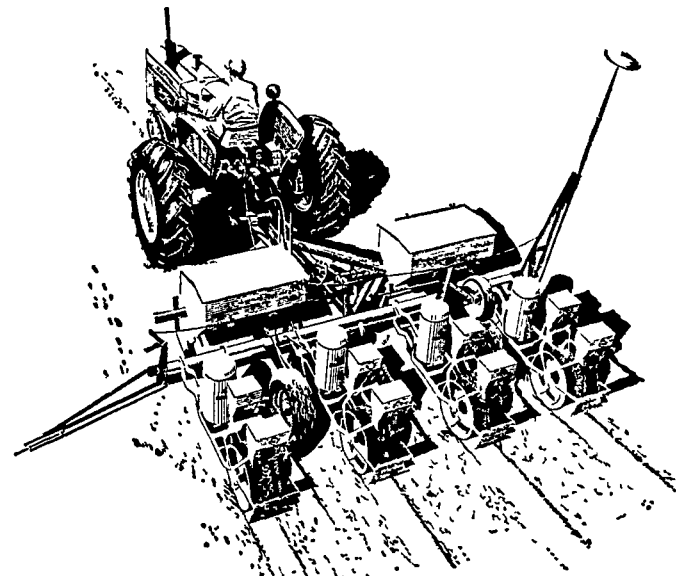
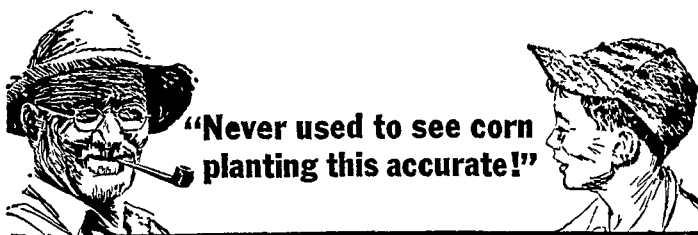
