

Holsteins Made Excellent In Recent Program

The Descriptive Type Classification program just completed in the Southeastern District of Pennsylvania involved 210 Registered Holstein herds. In these herds, there were 85 cows scored Excellent, 1108 cows scored Very Good, and 3371 cows scored Good Plus. The 14

counties that make up the Southeastern District are Adams, Berks, Bucks, Carbon, Chester, Delaware, Lancaster, Lehigh, Monroe, Montgomery, Northampton, Philadelphia, Schuylkill and York.

Each Registered Holstein is compared as an individual to the True-Type Model. The True-Type represents a maximum perfect score of 100 points. As in showing judging, the classifier patterns his scoring according to the Purebred Dairy Cattle Assn's Unified Score Card,

in which General Appearance is 30 points, Dairy Character is 20 points, Body Capacity is 20 points, and the Mammary System is 30 points. Registered Holsteins that obtain a score from 90 to 100 points are scored Excellent, from 85 to 89, Very Good, from 80 to 84, Good Plus; from 75 to 79, Good, from 65 to 74, Fair, and less than 64, Poor. There were 4564 animals in the 210 herds classified that obtained a score of 80 points or better.

The official classifiers of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America who determined the scores in the Southeastern District were: Ronald Chapman, Emmetsburg, Ia, Richard L. Cotta, Madison, Wis, Roger P. Denney, Frederick, Md; Charles J. Howe, Tunbridge, Vt., Melvin L. Johnson, Huntley, Ill, and Clyde H. Wilson, Rushville, Pa.

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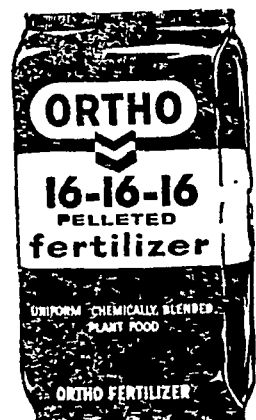
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
