Bull Announces Plans For Milk Promotion Meet

State Agriculture Secretary Leland H. Bull announced plans for a meeting March 1 to discuss possible methods of expanding milk promotion in Pennsylvania.

"Specifically," he said, "we will sound out dairy interests on the possibility of seeking a marketing order for milk, similar to the apple marketing order now in operation in Pennsylvania."

State apple growers last year approved a marketing order that provides promotion, advertising and research funds through a grower-assessment plan.

Secretary Bull said dairy producers and other interested dairy groups are invited to attend the meeting. It will be held in Room 305 of the Agriculture Building on N. Cameron St., beginning at 10 a.m., Friday, March 1.

Inter-State Adopts Resolution To Preserve Penna. Milk Agency

The Inter-State Milk Producers' Cooperative held their District Seven Members' Annual Dinner Meeting, Wednesday at Hostetter's Dining Hall.

In the business meeting, a resolution to preserve a separate Pennsylvania Milk Agency was adopted. They also resolved to write their Legislators in Harrisburg to keep milk marketing regulations as a separate arm of the Legislature. Clarence Stauffer, Ephrata dairy farmer, introduced the resolutions.

Paul E. Hand, economist for the Cooperative, said that if government accepts the recommendations of the cooperative to hold present milk prices to farmers, prices are expected to remain at present levels through the rest of this year and through June of next year in the Delaware Valley marketing area.

Boyd C. Gartley, director of Member and Public Relations, showed slides and told of his work with city groups in milk promotion.

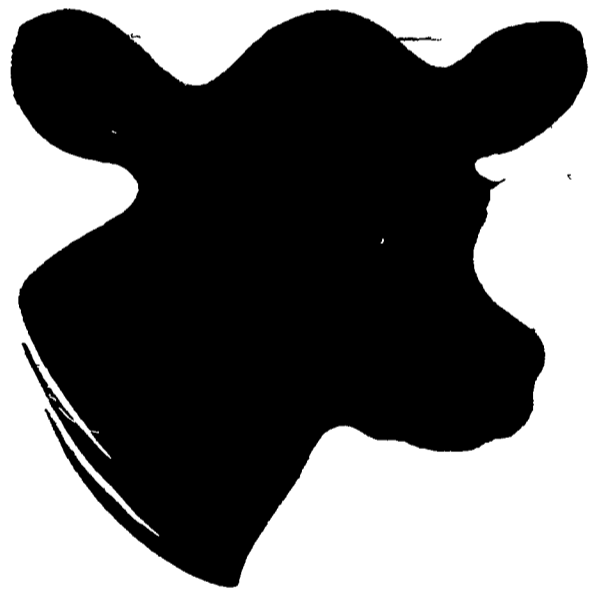

Local Cow Completes Year's Test Record

A special production testing report from the Holstein-Friesian Ass'n of America shows that Trout Spring Bil Ho Clover, owned by John E. Kreider, Lancaster, produced 19,156 lbs. of milk and 911 lbs. of butterfat in 365 days.

The three-year old cow made the record under Dairy Herd Improvement Registry rules, a program that incorporates the DHIA records of Registered Holstein cows into the national Association's breed improvement programs.
