

Penn-Del Farm To Receive Guernsey Award

PETERBOROUGH, N. H. — Raymond F. & Louise A. Witmer, owners of Penn-Del Farm, Willow Street, Pennsylvania have been named Gold Star Guernsey Breeder for 1967 by the American Guernsey-Cattle Club.

The Witmer's met all of the high requirements for this award during the past year. Some of these requirements were that all Guernseys over eight months of age owned by the farm were registered, that the herd included at least 10 registered Guernsey cows with production records made official during the year with at least 70% of them home-bred, that the herd was on official AR or HIR-DHIR test with a lactation average at least 15% over the breed average for either

milk or butterfat 305-2x M.E. and that 80% of the cows with official records completed during the year were classified with an average score for the group of 82.5% or better.

The production summary of the Witmer's herd showed 41 cows with 44 records averaging 12,142 pounds of milk and 599 pounds of fat, 305-2x M.E., and with an average classification for 40 cows of 85.6 percent.

To win a Gold Star Guernsey Breeder Award a herd must also meet rigid health requirements and an applicant for the award must be an active member of both a State Guernsey Association and the American Guernsey Cattle Club.

The Witmer's will receive a special certificate from the American Guernsey Cattle Club in recognition of their Gold Star Guernsey Breeder Award for 1967.

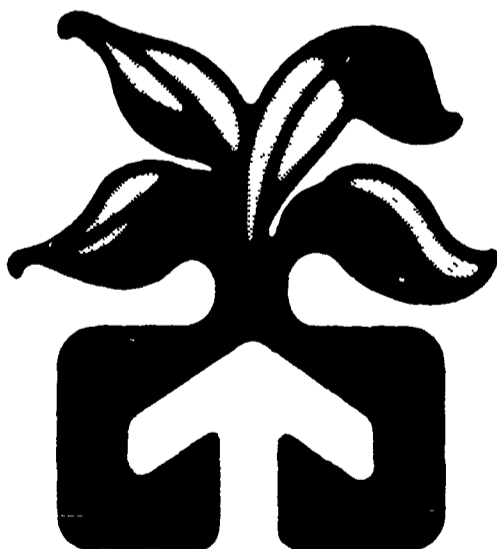
