

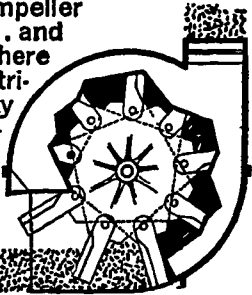

showed the felines had the disease.

The university's scientists believe that farm cats probably get TB from drinking unpasteurized milk in barns. The disease, harbored in the cats' lungs or intestines, then may infect new cattle (purchased to restock a dairy farm) which eat feed contaminated by cat spittle or cat stools.

"It's ridiculous to keep an infected cat in a barn and then restock with new cattle," Bull was told by the scientists.

Bull said the U. of P. scientists are also interested in the possibility that pet cats may get tuberculosis from humans and then transmit the infection to other humans.

He said the scientists have also expressed concern that cats and dogs owned by people who have contracted tuberculosis may infect children who fondle the animals.

The \$27,000 grant the State Department of Agriculture awarded to the university for research comes from the Pennsylvania Fair Fund which is administered by the department. The fund is financed by harness racing receipts.
