

The university's scientists believe that farm cats probably get TB from drinking unpasteurzed milk in barns. The disease, harbored in the cats' lungs or intestines, then may infect new cattle (purchased to restock a dairy farm) which eat feed contaminated by cat spittle or cat stools.

"It's ridiculous to keep an infected cat in a barn and then restock with new cattle." Bull was told by the scientists.

Bull said the U. of P. scientists are also interested in the possibility that pet cats may get tuberculosis from humans and then transmit the infestion to other humans

He said the scientists have also expressed concern that cats and dogs owned by people who have contracted tuberculosis may infect children who fondle the animals.
