



There are nearly 100,000 hunters in Pennsylvania under the age of 16 Game Commission studies indicate that there will be some 35,000 youths required to complete the course each year

District Game Protectors will be responsible for supervising the mand atory hunter safety training course in their areas. More than 5,000 hunter safety instructors have already been certified by the Game Commission.

Schools, sportsmen's clubs, civic groups and other organizations cooperate in scheduling and presenting hunter safety training.

Pennsylvania is the 15th state to make hunter safety training mandatory.
