Ladies, Have You Heard?...

If You Are Planning To Move...

Pick a reputable mover. Move only what you want because each piece adds to the weight.

You pay for the number of pounds you move.

Take jewelry, stamp or coin collections, and other small valuables with you. The mover isn't liable for these items unless he knowingly accepts them.

Pack things well. Wrap each piece of china, and glass separately and pack in heavy cartons.

You can save money if you pack your own things.

But remember, the carrier can say he's not liable for damage if faulty packing is the cause for breakage and other damages.

Mark all cartons showing which end is up.

Indicate on each carton which room it belongs in.

Take down diapers yourself. If the mover does this he'll bill you for the additional work.

Be ready to pay by certified check, money order, or cash. The driver may not unload until you pay him and you'll be charged for delay and storage.

Make Child's Mealtime Enjoyable

Use plastic mats to protect the table area where your child sits. Provide a chair that's com-

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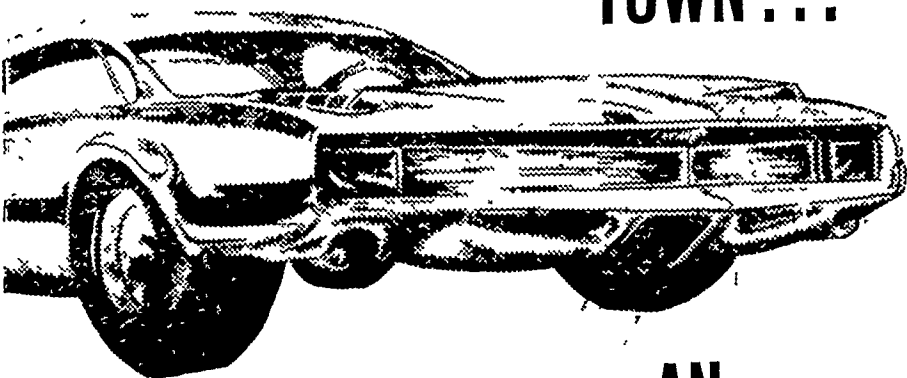
