



the machine If you do a lot of sewing, you may need to clean it more often Before oiling the machine is a good time to use the lint brush-remove the throat plate and clean the bobbin carrier. Use the brush wherever you see lint on machine parts.

Your best guide for oiling instructions is the manual that came with your sewing machine. needed One drop of oil in each Charcoal grill steaks, loin and plate is enough Never use too rib chops, patties, basted riblets, much oil on the machine and be sure to use the right kind of oil.

When the thread breaks and a tiny piece gets caught in the bobturn the balance wheel slightly to release the thread.



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
