Safety With Pesticides

Don't spray or dust a pet with a pesticide unless the product is labeled for such use. This means you don't use a flea powder on your cat because the label recommends it for dogs. The product may be all right for dogs, but cats will lick it off as they clean themselves.

Before buying a pesticide, read the label to find out on which animals you can use the pesticide safely. And always follow directions on the container for applying the pesticide and what precautions to take in using and storing it.

Tips On Cooking Lamb

Never overcook lamb. The unique flavor and juiciness of lamb at an internal temperature of 170 degrees is most acceptable. Moisture escapes if the meat is cooked to a higher temperature internally than 170 degrees.

Use low temperatures when you cook lamb. Food loss is much less when you cook at lower temperatures.

Always cook according to the cut. Some cuts are adaptable to any method of cooking while other cuts are more desirable when you use a specific cooking method.

Cooking method depends on tenderness, size and thickness of the cut and available cooking facilities.

Roast legs, loins, racks and shoulders.

Broil or fry, sirloin steaks, loin and rack rib chops, ground patties.

Charcoal grill steaks, loin and rib chops, patties, basted riblets, and breasts.

Braise shoulder chops, stew meat, shanks, breasts, and riblets.

For Better Sewing Results

For top performance from your sewing machine, keep it clean. This means taking out lint and dust regularly.

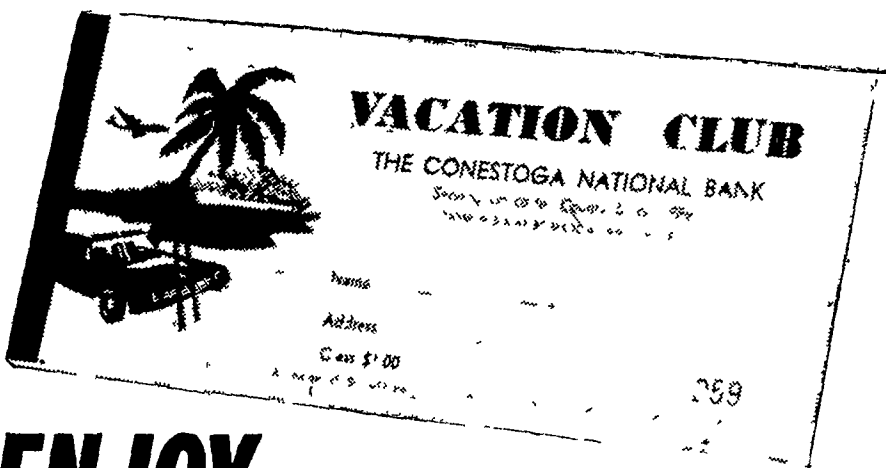
Keep the machine covered when not in use and you'll cut down on the dust that gets into the working parts. A small brush is a must for removing lint.

At least once a month clean the machine. If you do a lot of sewing, you may need to clean it more often. Before oiling the machine is a good time to use the lint brush—remove the throat plate and clean the bobbin carrier. Use the brush wherever you see lint on machine parts.

Your best guide for oiling instructions is the manual that came with your sewing machine. Check the places where oil is needed. One drop of oil in each plate is enough. Never use too much oil on the machine and be sure to use the right kind of oil.

When the thread breaks and a tiny piece gets caught in the bobbin, turn the balance wheel slightly to release the thread.

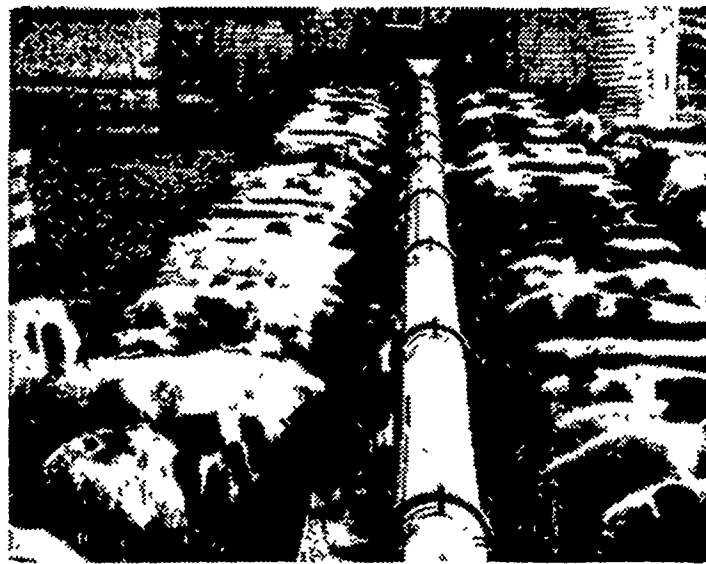
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
