Members and their husbands and friends will attend The Passion Play by the Hopewell United Methodist Church on June 29.

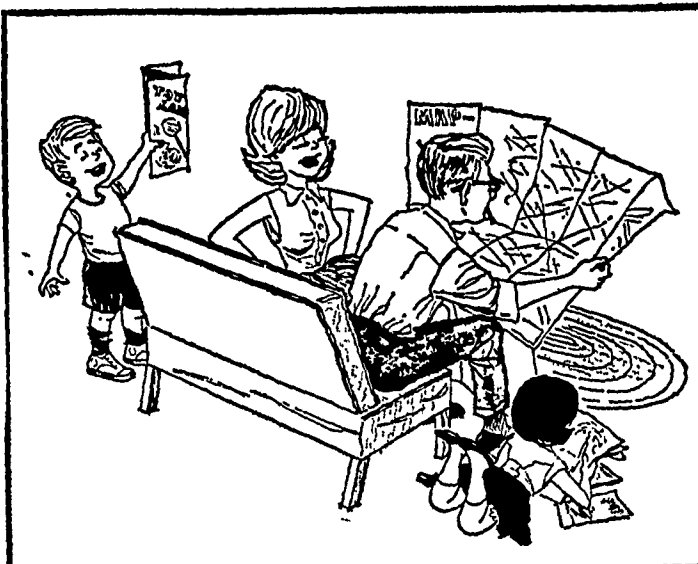

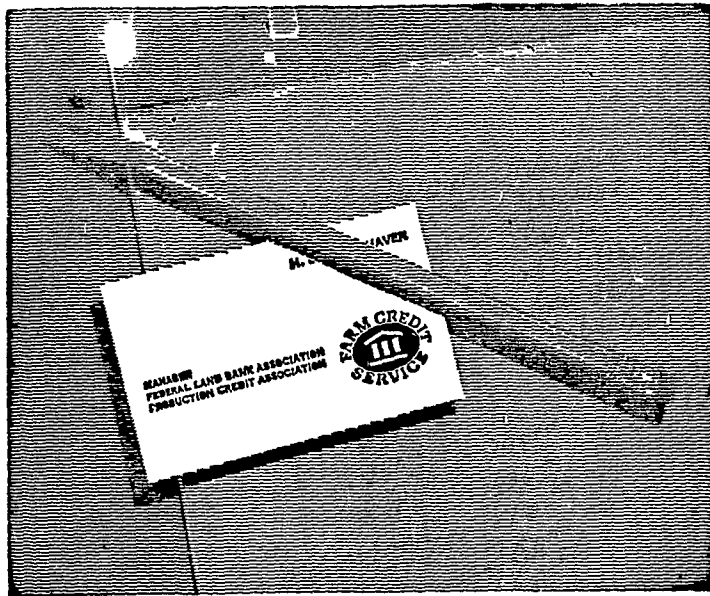

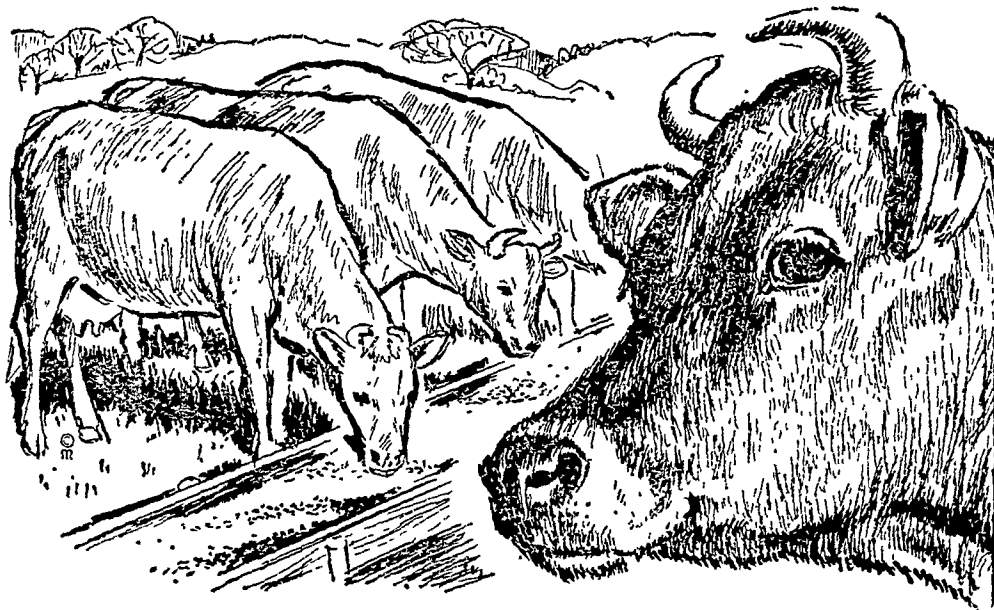
