Local DHIA Testers Given Merit Awards

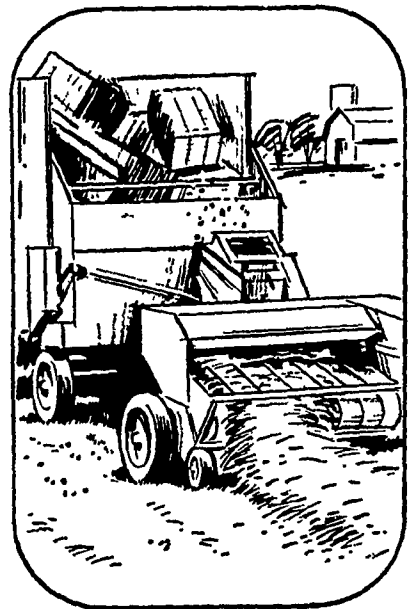
