Important Notice To Poultrymen On Price Quoting Change

Ed. Note: The Pennsylvania Egg Marketing Association at the meeting of May 10, appointed Mr. Samuel Berenson, of Chick Sales, and Mr. Varnier Carpenter of D. V. Carpenter Marketing, Inc. and other interested industry men to represent the Penna. Egg Group in regard to the change of quoting in Umer Barry Publication. As a result of their efforts, the following was reported in the May 15 Producers Price Current.

Effective with the issue of Monday, the 27th of May, 1968, the Producers' Price Current shell egg quotations will carry the following listings.

The present listings on large browns, large whites, and mediums whites ("other grades") will be eliminated.

The editors of the Price-Current have taken this step in response to an outpouring of industry sentiment recommending such action, and in the sincere belief that more orderly pricing at all trade levels will result.

The shell egg committee of the New York Mercantile Exchange meeting to consider this matter was presented with 135 letters and telegrams recommending the discontinuance of trading in the Exchange grades of No. 1 large and No. 1 mediums, the so called second grades, and over 30 more have been received up to this writing. Two telegrams favoring the continuation of trading in these grades were received. The committee, with one member absent, voted six in favor and six opposed. Further consideration by the Exchange may be taken at a later date.

Some adjusting of present marketing arrangements, many long standing, will be necessary when the simplified report goes into effect. It is for this reason that the change in the Price-Current report was scheduled for the 27th of May rather than the 20th. Advice of the change will be disseminated through the trade press immediately.

All open bids and offers posted on the Exchange's trading boards and all recorded sales will continue to be reported in the Producers' Price-Current.

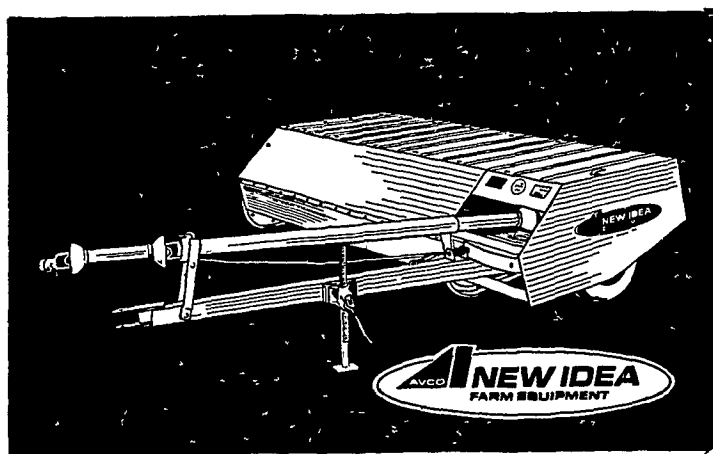

— first in Ephrata, then at the present Lancaster site.

The new hatchery construction will incorporate a broad range of new developments to provide maximum conditions of sanitation and poultry health protection. It has been designed as well for operational efficiency, with special attention paid to work-flow patterns.

From this new center, chicks will be shipped throughout Pennsylvania; to New York, New Jersey, Ohio, Delaware, Maryland and the northern reaches of Virginia and West Virginia.

Although there will be limited production of commercial meat birds, primary attention will be focussed upon the hatching of breeding stock and serving customers for the Hubbard Meat Breeder Pullet and the Hubbard White Mountain Male. The new plant also will continue to produce the Hubbard Golden Comet, a leading brown egg layer, and the Kimber White Leghorn.

Help Prevent Pesticide Mishaps

Take special care to keep children and animals away from mixing, dusting and spraying areas, says Boys. And apply pesticides carefully for correct coverage and minimum drift. Use any recommended protective clothing or mechanical devices. Wash and change clothing when the job is done.

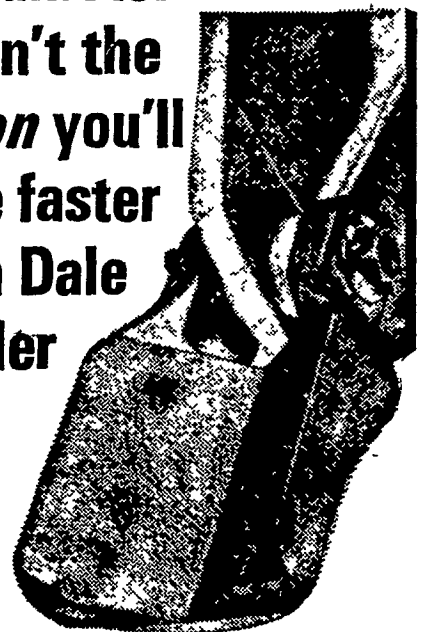

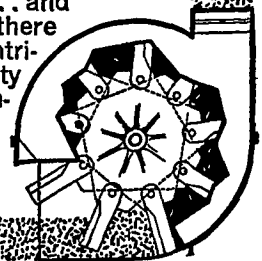
