

## Seiverling Has DeKalb Award At Warwick

Howett L. Seiverling has been named the recipient of the 1968 DeKalb Agricultural Award, given annually to the outstanding senior in vocational agriculture. To receive this award, he excelled in scholarship, leadership, and farming program activities during his four years in high school. Howett is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold L. Seiverling of Lititz R1, and was just graduated from Warwick High School. He was on the honor roll three years, a member of the National Honor Society, Iron Arrow, and an active member of the Future Farmers of America.

Howett's activities in the FFA consisted of serving as Reporter as a Sophomore, President as a Junior and Senior and was President of the Lancaster County FFA Chapter his Senior year. He represented Lancaster County as the Official Delegate to the summer and mid-winter conventions of the state association. He was named the Star Greenhand his Freshman year, Star Chapter Farmer as a Sophomore, Star Chapter Red Rose Farmer as a Junior and was first runner-up to the Star Farmer of Lancaster County and received the Keystone Farmer Degree his Senior year. He placed fifth in the State Milk Products Judging Contest at Penn State and represented Pennsylvania at the North Atlantic Regional Contests in Springfield, Mass.

Young Seiverling's farming program has centered around dairy primarily, having received the Lancaster Ayrshire Calf at Lampeter Fair in his Sophomore year. He successfully

showed her at the District and State Junior Dairy Shows last summer, receiving several showmanship awards and blue ribbons. He presently owns four head of dairy animals. He has successfully conducted programs in poultry and tobacco, as well; having shown tobacco at local fairs and the County FFA Show.

Howett has been accepted to continue his education at the Berks Center of The Pennsylvania State University to study Agricultural Business and Management. Upon graduation he plans to enter into productive farming of the agricultural industry.

Howett is the eleventh student of Warwick High School to be awarded the DeKalb Agricultural Award and his name will be engraved on a special plaque provided by the sponsor. ### USE VERBENAS TO EDGE FLOWERBEDS

Use verbenas as edging when planting your flower beds this year. Their fragrant flowers in white, pink, rose, red, maroon and purple bloom from mid-summer until frost.

Verbenas are low, spreading plants with soft foliage and flowers in flat heads. According to a Pennsylvania State University correspondence course on annual flowers, they grow from 8 to 18 inches tall and spread 2 feet when planted in fertile soil fully exposed to sun. Superior varieties include

(Continued from Page 17) come on the market, or for minor disruptions in delivery, such as snowstorm or breakdown of equipment, and so forth.

2. A new base will be made each July-December; if a farmer's production goes up, so will his base; if his production goes down, so will his base.

3. A base blend price is paid for base milk during March through June of the following year, with the Class II price paid for production in excess of base. The base blend price will be above the market average blend price, so as to provide a price advantage to those producers whose production is in line with their base.

4. Bases can be transferred in their entirety (no partial base transfer).

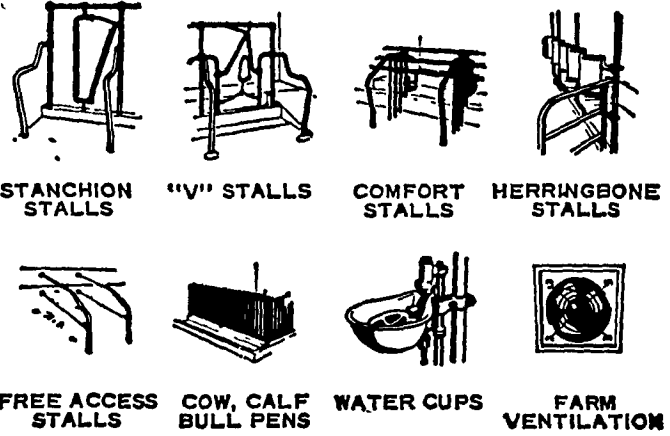
The base program does not prevent herd expansion. It does, however, economically guide expansion to the last six months of the year, July through December.

Producers in other markets where this plan has been used have been able to move toward the market needs of level seasonal production.

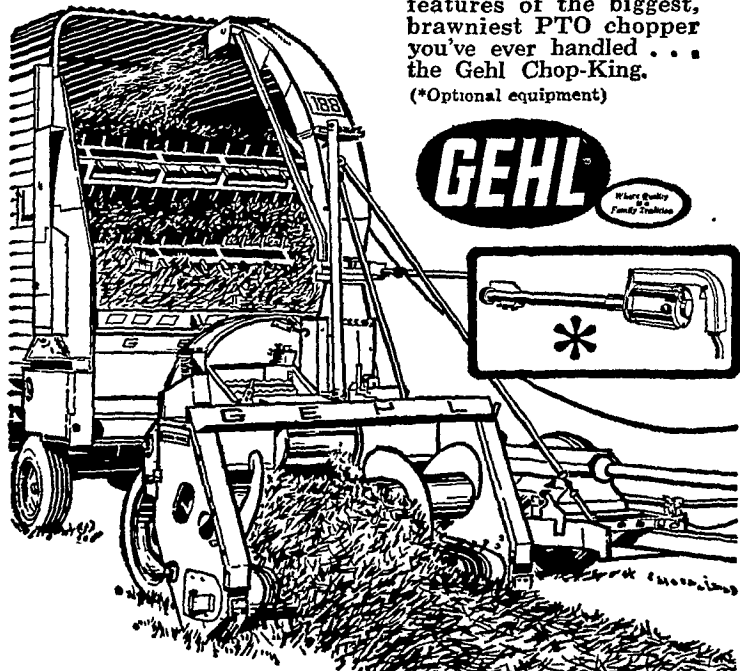

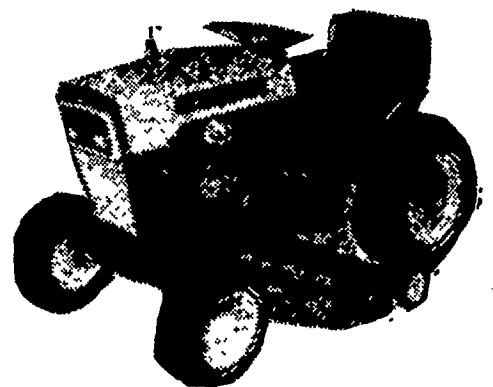
