An Itchy Problem; Control Poison Ivy

Poison Ivy control can be an itchy problem, but you can kill it without too much danger if you use the right chemicals and try to put the spray on poison correct technique.

Dr James Parochetti, weed control specialist at the University of Maryland, says that grubbing or pulling is not a satisfactory method of control because it is almost impossible to get all the roots If you leave a little bit of root in the ground, you will soon have a new plant
