Averril L. Royer, 17, of 2025 Oregon Pike, Lancaster, will join with 59 other older Commonwealth youths to supervise program activities of the 1000-member delegation attending Congress. She was selected to return this year on the basis of her leadership abilities exhibited at last year's event. Averril is one of five youths selected to return.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert M. Royer, she is a mem-

ber of three county 4-H Clubs. She has completed projects in dairy, horse, sheep, beef, sewing, cooking, flowers, photography and leadership.

The Leadership Council advisor participated in activities at the National 4-H Dairy Conference, State 4-H Days, and Junior Leaders Retreat.


Cooperative Extension Service personnel, including University staff members, county agents, and Extension home economists, will assist with program activities.

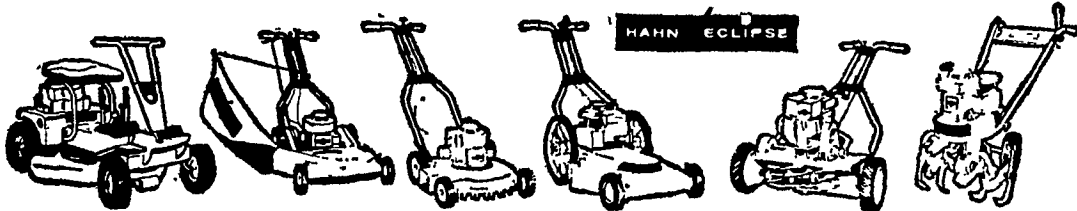

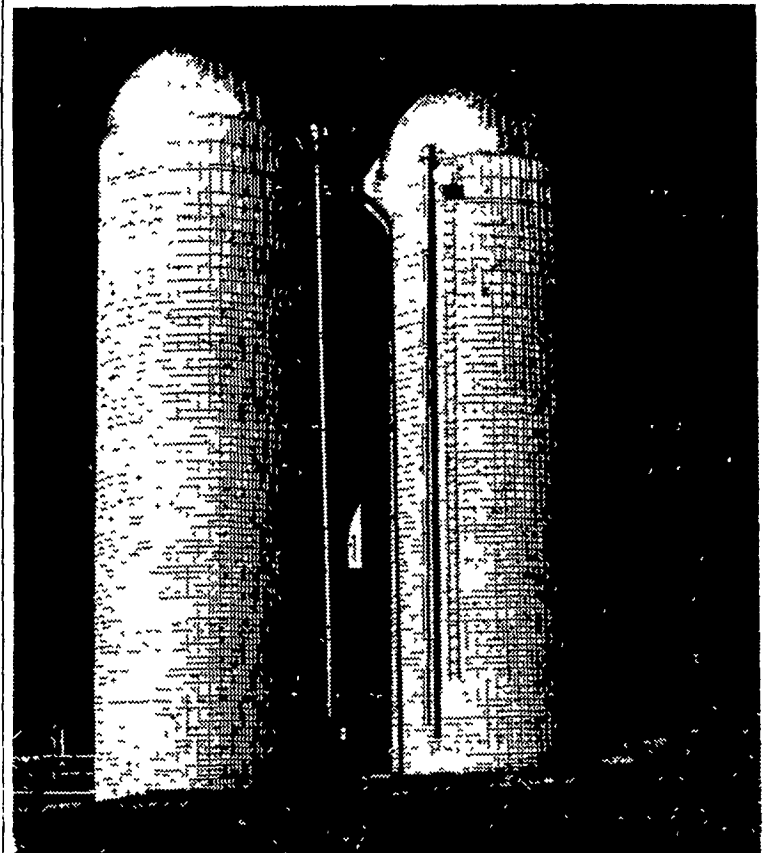
