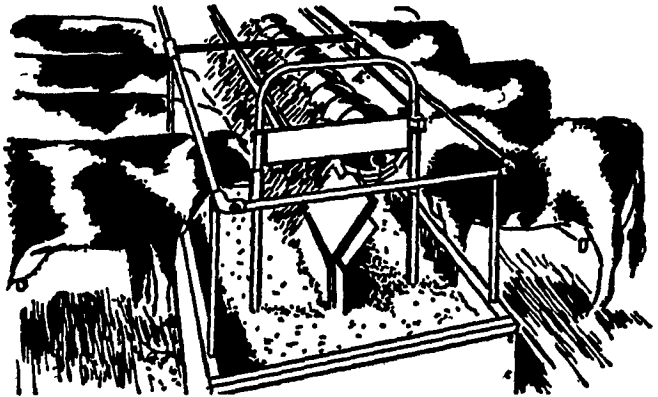
The meeting ended with a few remarks from the leaders.
