Farmers Warned On Fed Cattle Weights

Sec. of Agric. Orville L. Freeman has called attention to the fact that marketing weights of fed cattle recently have started

The Secretary warned that this trend could hurt fed cattle prices, which have been higher

He said one of the main reasons for the stronger price has been the good judgment shown by cattle feeders in the orderly marketing of their cattle as they reached proper finish for their grade.

He noted that average weights of fed steers sold by farmers the first three weeks of June ranged from 6 to 16 pounds heavier than a year earlier.

"I hope that cattle feeders will not succumb to the temptation to hold back cattle in the feedlots and carry them to heavier weights," Freeman said, warning that the extra poundage is the fastest route to driving down cattle prices.

He stressed that cattlemen have in their own hands a most effective tool for maintaining cattle prices — that of resisting the urge to hold their cattle too Contestants for the Lancaster long, thereby adding price-de-




