would not be without. "If you don't get your calves started well, you may as well get out of the dairy business," he says.

And obviously the calves at Kieffers are well cared for.

At present, there are 180 cows milking with 30 dry and the rest of the total heifers and calves. After the fire they sold their milking herd so the present herd includes 160 first calf heifers, some of them coming in with second calf. Grant says it was quite an episode last summer milking 160 first calf heifers; doing field work and building the barn. But he still would rather work like that than be laid up with infected tonsils like he was when interviewed Tuesday.

Mr. and Mrs. Kieffer farm 750

acres including 300 near Honey Brook and 65 in Maryland. They employ three full-time men and an extra lady to help milk. They have a 1600 gal. milk tank and ship 12,000 lbs. milk every other day. King Pin and two of their own bulls are used as herd sires.

An added side-line to the dairy operation is feeding the bull calves to 1,000 lbs. for beef. They keep the castrated calves for about 1½ years and they sell very well on the fed cattle market. "If we had the room we would do it with all of them," he said.

Kieffer has been farming all his life. He started with tobacco when he was nine and had his first cow at 14. The Hazelbrook Farms are located south of the Buck on the road to Goshen.

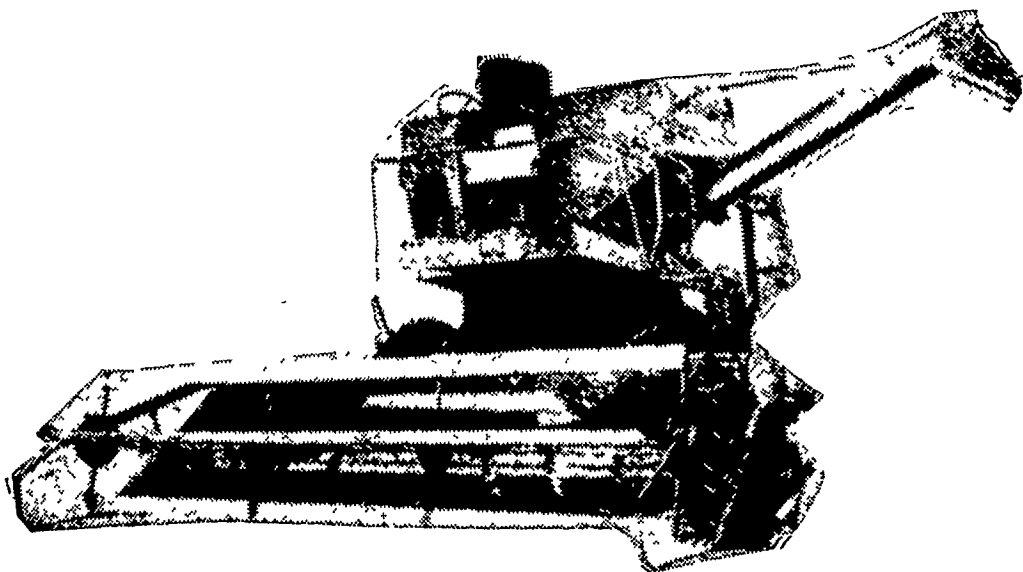
