Cattle Field Day To Be Held By Extension

The Lancaster County Agricultural Extension Service, in cooperation with the Lancaster Livestock Exchange and the Union Stock Yards Company, will sponsor an all-day Cattlemen's Field Day at the Stock Yards on Friday, August 9. According to M. M. Smith, County Agricultural Agent, the program will be as follows:

10 00 a.m. — Cattle Grading School conducted by Mr James Anderson, U.S. Marketing Service, Lancaster. (Feeders will have a chance to grade several groups of feeder calves, yearlings, and fat cattle, and then Anderson will give the official government grade.)

12 o'clock noon — Box Lunch at the Stock Yards (advance reservations needed—Dutch Treat.)

1:00 p.m. — "Trends in Midwest Cattle Country", Ben Noel, Certified Livestock Markets Inc.

Shafer Signed Bill To Promote And Advertise Pa. Ag. Products

Governor Raymond P. Shafer has signed Senate Bill 1273 which provides for marketing programs to promote and advertise Pennsylvania agricultural commodities.

It enables producers to establish, through referendums, assessment plans to raise funds for promotion and advertising of their own specific commodities, and for research to benefit their own industry.

Pa. Game Commission's Triple Trophy Award To Co. Sportsmen

Two Lancaster County sportsmen earned the Pennsylvania Game Commission's coveted Triple Trophy Award during the 1967-68 seasons, it was announced this week by Information and Education Chief Roy W. Trexler.

Stephen S. Fisher, Willow Street R1, and Maurice Waters, Jr., New Providence R1, were among 102 state hunters that bagged a wild turkey, an antlered whitetail deer and a black bear during the same hunting

license year. Actually, Pennsylvania is one of the few states where it is possible to harvest all three species.

This is the second year for the award. The 102 winners during the 1967-68 seasons are considerably more than the 67 who qualified during the first year of the program.

"There is a rather logical explanation for the big increase in winners this year," Trexler said. "No less than 33 of the winners
