## No Retirement Planned For Smokey The Bear

If Smokey Bear, the national symbol of forest fire prevention, could speak, he would probably paraphrase Mark Twain by saying rumors of his impending retirement are "greatly exaggerated." It just isn't true.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman, one of Smokey's bosses, said recently there are no current plans either to retire or replace "Smokey" at the Washington, D. C., National Zoo. This was corroborated by Dr. Theodore Reed, director of the zoo where Smokey has made his home since he was a cub in 1950.

The mistaken notion of Smokey's retirement apparently grew out of an offer last week that an orphaned cub was available if the zoo wanted it. Somehow, the idea came out in print that the cub would take the place of the full-grown black bear in the Washington Zoo.

Malcolm Hardy, chief of Cooperative Forest Fire Prevention for the Forest Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, said Smokey is still healthy and strong and gives every indication of spending many years yet at the zoo with Mrs. Smokey. His long-range future, however, is under active study by the Smokey Bear Executive Committee, comprised of federal and state foresters and the National Advertising Council.

Smokey Bear has been the symbol of forest fire prevention for 23 years, and just a few months ago, a nationwide poll showed he was one of the most popular symbols on the American scene.

The "live Smokey" was added to the promotion campaign June 30, 1950, when the cub was turned over to the zoo by Lyle

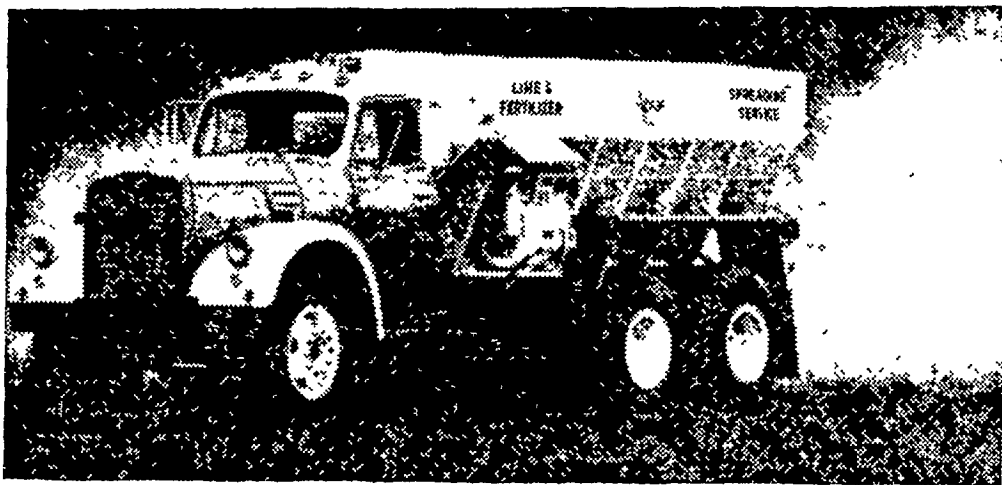
