Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add next four ingredients and blend well. Chill until the consistency of unbeaten egg whites. Stir in vegetables. Pour into a 6 cup ring mold. Chill until firm, about 4 hours. Unmold. Blend sour cream with horseradish. Serve with salad. Makes 8 servings.

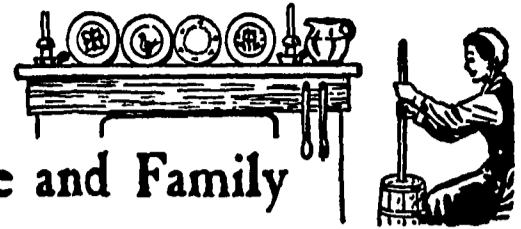
The program is planned by the Ways and Means Committee. Members will be contacted about the program.

Ladies, Have You Heard? . . .

Eliminate Seam Puckers
Easy thread tensions and easy presser foot pressure are keys to eliminating seam pucker in easy-care fabrics.

Take a few minutes and experiment before you start to sew.

As you begin a sewing project, test stitch on the warp grain of the fabric so you will know if you need to adjust the top thread tension and the presser foot tension. Check your machine instruction book for directions on such adjustments.

Understand your machine and keep it in good condition.

How To Cook Vegetables On Outdoor Grill
You can cook vegetables in foil-wrapped bundles on the grill.

To prepare bundled vegetables, cut heavy-duty foil twice the size needed to wrap the food. You can use regular household foil cut four times the size needed.

Place the food on top of the foil just a bit off center.

Bring the foil up over the food so that the edges meet on all three sides.

Make a tight seal by folding the edges two or more times in about 1/2 inch folds.

Press edges tightly on the three open sides so the food will be snugly wrapped.

Put the package on the grill or coals, watch carefully, and turn often to prevent burning.

Bundles will take 10 to 45 minutes to cook, depending on the vegetable.

When cooked, open one side of the package and put in serving dish. Or you can fix individual servings in separate bundles and eat directly from the foil.

To cook frozen foods in foil, add butter, salt, and pepper if you wish. A little water is us-

nally necessary for proper cooking.

Would You Buy Frozen Meat?
New technology provides high-quality frozen meat. It's frozen 30 to 50 degrees below zero. As a result, beef keeps its bright red color.

New frozen meat may possibly help hold prices down because freezing prevents waste.

Clean Outdoor Furniture

It takes more than rain to keep outdoor furniture clean and attractive, says Mrs. Helen Puskar, Penn State extension home furnishings specialist. It takes sudsy water and effort on your part, and the cooperation of family members. Suitable equipment, such as brushes for scrubbing, sponges, several two-inch paint brushes for cleaning hard-to-get-at places, clean cloths for wiping furniture, plenty of soap, a hose, will help to make the cleaning easier.



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
