Safety Training Mandatory For Young Hunters In 1969

Youths in Pennsylvania under the age of sixteen who have never possessed a hunting license will be required to complete a hunter safety training course before being eligible for a hunting license after September 1, 1969.

Under recently-enacted legislation, beginning September 1 of next year no hunting license will be issued to any person under the age of sixteen years unless he presents either (a) evi-

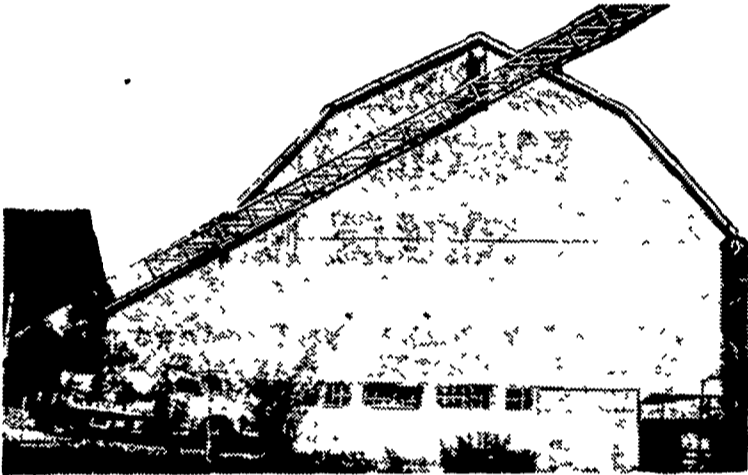
"Hunter safety training does not become mandatory for persons under 16 until September 1 of next year," Behel said. "However, I would strongly en-
