Children See Eggs Hatching On TV

"Making 7 million children across the country a little more egg conscious is easy with an assist from the ROMPER ROOM television programs," reports Dr. L. A. Wilhelm, PENB President. "With more than 50 individual ROMPER ROOM teachers broadcasting locally to every part of the country, they are able to capture the attention of these youngsters on a very 'personal' basis... and the kids love it!"

Recently, the ROMPER ROOMS presented the story of egg hatching by using either film in areas where fertile eggs could not be supplied, or an actual live demonstration which was successfully conducted in most areas with the help of PENB and USDA contacts. This was just a start. Nancy Claster of Burt Claster Productions, producers of ROMPER ROOM, reported that the response to the

egg segments of the programs was so good, that PENB has been asked to continue its co-operation for next year. In addition, the egg will receive still more attention on the ROMPER ROOM next Spring when a "teach-it" entitled "All About Eggs" will be broadcast. "All About Eggs" is a color slide presentation created by PENB and designed to acquaint children with fundamental information about eggs, their origin, anatomy, nourishment, and flavor values. Its purpose is to stimulate an interest for eggs in children whose habits are just being formed.

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
