

Now A Liquid Tire Chain For Rural Use

Winter driving is hazardous enough in the cities, where well-travelled streets and nearby service facilities relieve the motorist of some of his anxieties about being stuck in ice or snow.

The same cannot often be said for rural areas, where driv-

ers face being stranded in some rather inhospitable surroundings.

SAFETY TRAINING MANDATORY FOR YOUNG HUNTERS NEXT YEAR

Pennsylvania youths were reminded this week by the Game Commission that hunter safety training does not become mandatory in the state until Sept. 1 of next year.

After Sept. 1, 1969, a youth under the age of sixteen who has never possessed a hunting license will be required to complete a hunter safety training course before being eligible for a hunting license.

Some hunters apparently think the rule becomes effective this year. It does not apply until 1969.

Know Your Social Security Status

If you or your spouse had to make a Social Security claim tomorrow, would you have all the necessary documents? It's good family business sense to have an inventory of all important documents and to keep them in a secure but accessible place, advises Helen E. Bell, extension home management specialist of Penn State University.

When the time comes to make a Social Security claim, you need certain documents. Among these are: Proof of ages of husband and wife, Social Security Cards for both; marriage certificate; copy of the latest income tax withholding statement (Form W-2) or a copy of the latest income tax return if you are self-employed; birth certificates or adoption order; and where applicable, death certificate of worker who died; receipted funeral bill if someone other than widow or widower claims a lump sum death benefit, and divorce papers.

Keep up to date with your claim information, suggests Miss Bell. Requesting a statement of Social Security earnings every three years verifies the accuracy of the reports of your earnings. It also helps keep the Social Security office's records straight.

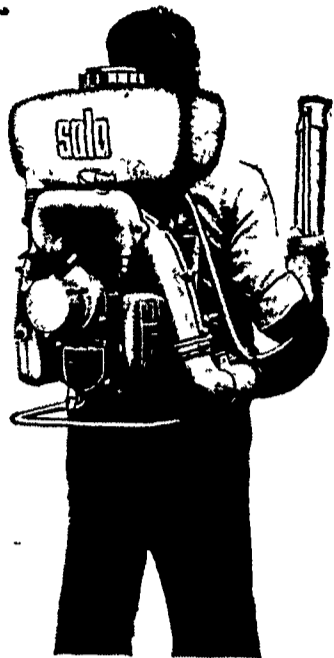
For a statement of earnings, get a special card from your local Social Security representative. If your name has been changed from the one shown on your Social Security account number card, copy it as shown on the card below your current signature. Send the card to Social Security Administration, P. O. Box 57, Baltimore, Md. 21203. If you can't get this special card, take a regular post card and list your account number, date of birth, name and complete address, request for a statement of earnings in your Social Security account, and your signature. Send card to the Baltimore address.

Proper Maintenance Saves Machinery

Farm machinery repair costs usually range between 10 and 120 percent of new machinery costs, according to Thomas H. Williams, extension agricultural engineer at the University of Delaware.

Proper maintenance, however, reduces machinery wear and repair costs and helps prolong machinery life. More important, a well conditioned machine insures efficient operation and helps get work done on time.

A well equipped farm shop can save farmers a considerable amount of money, says Williams. And proper tools stored in an orderly manner will save a good deal of time on many repairs.

A good shop includes most of the tools and equipment necessary for maintaining and repairing the machinery on a particular farm, he adds. The shop should be wired for adequate lighting and should have enough electrical outlets to accommodate all electrical equipment.

Working space should be allocated so that machinery, tools and labor may be combined with peak efficiency. Generally speaking, it is advisable to provide machinery storage and shop facilities in the same building.

This allows comfort and convenience in servicing machines and provides dry, well-lighted working space in bad weather.

Secure your knives in a knife rack or other device which covers the blade, suggests Purdue University's extension safety specialist.
