

USDA Issues Pamphlet On Beef Yield Grades

A new pamphlet discussing the U.S. Department of Agriculture's beef yield grades has been published by the agency's Consumer and Marketing Service. This publication, entitled "Yield Grades For Beef" (MB 45), illustrates and tells in detail how these grades are determined and what they mean to producers, packers, retailers and consumers.

The pamphlet emphasizes how yield grades benefit retailers by providing them with a readily available means of buying beef with complete assurance as to its yield of retail cuts.

The percentage of retail cuts

that can be expected from each of the five grades is given, along with charts showing yield and value differences for carcasses of the different yield grades.

Packers and producers will also find the publication helpful since it illustrates and discusses how to identify cattle that produce the highest yields of meat. It explains how producers may benefit financially from raising cattle with thickly muscled carcasses, a high quality of lean, and a minimum of excess fat.

USDA's Carcass Evaluation Service, the publication states, is available to producers who wish to use it as a means of getting precise carcass information about thin cattle. Under this

service, USDA meat graders will provide producers with information on the quality grades, yield grades, and other evaluations of the carcasses of their beef cattle. This is especially useful information to purebred breeders involved in progeny testing or to producers or feeders who are interested in the carcass characteristics of cattle of known origin.

Automatic Egg Cooker Wins First PENB Test Kitchen Seal

The Poultry and Egg National Board has awarded its first Test Kitchen Seal to a firm that helps sell eggs—at least indirectly.

The Salton Manufacturing Company, New York City, recently submitted its Egg-O-Matic Cooker to the PENB Test Kitchen for evaluation as a new consumer product. The Test Kitchen project is under the supervision of Patricia Myles, PENB director of home economics.

In her report to Lewis L. Salton, the company's president, Miss Myles said the compact "dial-an egg" cooker performed consistently and satisfactorily under a variety of test conditions, such as the product will encounter in consumer use. The test included product performance as well as analysis of the

cooked eggs to determine quality.

The PENB Test Kitchen Seal program is available to any company for those consumer products which are used in preparing or storing eggs. If the product meets PENB's exacting standards of performance, the approval seal is awarded and may be used in consumer promotions.

The Egg-O-Matic Cooker soon will be distributed nationally by the Salton Manufacturing Company.
